Best grasshopper poisoning results when the young are still in the nymph stage, says Dr. F. E. whitehead, Oklahoma A. and M. College entomologist.

While the nights are cool, the insects seek warmth close ground where they have the poison bran to early morning ap-At this stage they are not difficult to kill and less poison is required

An effective poison bait may b obtained by mixing 25 pounds of mill-run bran, 31/2 bushels of sawdust (three times bulk of millrun bran), and 2 quarts of sodium to 12 gallons of arsenite in 10 water.

The sawdust is spread out to a depth of four to six inches on a some other smooth surfloor or The bran then is placed in
