Diptheria Still Strikes Despite **Immunization**

"It is a generally accepted fact among public health authorities, preventive measure. Wherever immunizing treatment has been extensively used, diphtheria has steadily decreased

"The most forceful weapon in the control of diphtheria is prethrough immunization. rather than cure of the disease after it has developed. Children can be protected against diphtheria by the use of what is known as toxoid. Young children are particularly susceptible to the Accordingly, as soon as the baby is six months old, the parents are advised to take it to the family physician and have it immunized-protected, by the use of toxoid. Older children in the family who have not had the protective treatment, should be immunized also, and this should be attended to now before the school session begine. Let's Support The Tax Re-Allocation Law

......

The rising costs of the government of Gray County makes it absolutely necessary that more revenue from some source be forthcoming, and the only way in which the county can get more money is through taxation of its citizens.

The commissioners of the court are asking that they be given the authority to re-allocate the present maximum tax rates as follows: General Fund, now 25 cents on the hundred dollars valuation, to be raised to 26 cents; Jury Fund, now 15 cents, to be lowered to 4 cents; Road and Bridge Fund, now 15 cents, to be raised to 21 cents; and Permanent Improvement Fund, now 25 cents, to be raised to 29 cents.

The maximum tax rate at present is 80 cents on the hundred dollars valuation, and the maximum rate, under the proposed re-allocation, WILL REMAIN AT 80 CENTS. This maximum cannot be raised, but the commissioners need more money in the road and bridge fund, the permanent improvement fund, and the general fund-and less in the jury fund-if the county's functions are to be continued in the same manner to which we are accustomed.

If the road and bridge fund does not get more money, the roads cannot be maintained as they are at present. Machinery costs more, and maintenance of machinery costs more. The men who work for our commissioners need more money to live on, due to the rising costs of living. and many of them will be forced to quit their present jobs if their salaries are not raised.

We, the undersigned citizens of McLean, believe that, for the benefit of the county, the citizens should vote for the re-allocation of taxes. We further believe that if this is not approved, then our valuations will have to be raised, which would naturally raise our taxes. So we say . . .
