This fee will furnish some time, and made a study of them with ink for the entire year. The fee is being collected so that ink can be provided throughout the year in each classroom and study hall. By using this method, the students will not have to buy their own ink, and it has been found that the spilling of individual bottles of ink is prevented by this system. The fee will be charged only to high school students, since grade school students use only a small amount of ink.
