

Denison will be 75 years old next Scotember 23, and from September

1-6 there will be a week long Diamond Jubileo celebration.

Dozens of Oklahoma Indians, whose ancestors lived just across the
Red River, when Denison grew out of the wilderness, will be on hand,
as well as hundreds of cowboys and thousands of other visitors—all attired in costumes of the '70's.

There will be parades and pageants, street dances and a rodeo; Old Fiddlers' contests, stdewalk chuck wagons and street carnivals. The entire business district will be closed to traffic for the whole week and transamed into a midway for the recreation of a boisterous frontier city. On Saturday, September 6, the closing day of the Jublice, a tiny wood-burning Katy locomotive, pulling five ancient cars will wheeze down from Oklahoma, cross the Red River and enter Denison, to re-enact the arrival of the first train to arrive in Texas from the North. The event actually occurred on December 25, 1872, and some of the children. who were on the platform that dry with their pioneer parents will be honored guests for the re-enactment.

This will be the highlight of the celebration, which has been planned by the city and the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad. Denison was built by the Katy as its Southern terminal. It has remained one of its most important points during the past 75 years.

Officials of the railroad will ride the train into the city September 6, as well as Governor Beauford Jester of Texas: Governor Roy Turner of Oklahoma, and other notables. Later the Governors will address the thousands expected for the event, Other speakers will include Sam Ray-burn, former Speaker of the United States House of Representatives: Raymond J. Morfa, Katy Board Chairman, and Donald V. Fraser, the

### **Shade Helps Dairy Cattle**

type of shade is one essential of summer management for the of DDT to help eliminate flies. dairyman, says Harry W. Cave head of the Oklahoma A. and M dairy department.

"Ample quantities of cool clean water during this period," points out Cave, "is necessary for high milk production. Cows need beween 100 and 150 pounds of water day to cool the body, make the milk, help digest the feed and eliminate waste.

Farmers must watch pastures closely and as soon as they are grazed down so there is reasonable doubt cattle are getting enough to eat, supplement the pasture with hay.

"To dairy cattle on pasture, a sufficient amount of salt and bone meal should always be provided. A good mineral mixture is made of equal parts of salt, bone meal and finely ground limestone," Cave

For heavy milk production, cows should be treated kindly and not

over heated by driving or hurrying them rapidly to the barn. It is important that cows be

"Barns and cattle should be sprayed with some approved type states the dairy cattle specialist This will make it possible for the cows to graze in comfort and consume more pasture.



TO THE ADDRESSED ASSOCIATION:

IN RE: Free Ambulance Service

Numerous complaints have been coming into this Department with reference to free ambulance service being given by funeral homes who are eperating burial associations or other mutual assessment companies in conjunction with a funeral home.

Your attention is called to the several Board Orders previously issued advising the associations that it is against the law for the associations or their agents to give free ambulance service as an inducement to sell insurance or collect premiums. The associations giving free ambulance service are advised that it is almost an impossibility to drew a line for such services between members and non-members; therefore, it is requested that all funeral homes connected with such companies discontinue the giving of free ambulance service.

Should the association or other mutual assessment companies have further complaints filed against them the burden of proof will be placed on the company or association that such service is not being given as an inducement to sell insurance or to collect premiums. If such evidence is found against the parties complained of, the Board of Insurance Commissioners will be requested to cancel the certificate of authority for the companies operating in the State of Texas.

We dislike to take the above attitude in enforcing the law; however, it is becoming necessary through the many complaints being filed that definite steps must be taken to curtail such practices and your immediate cooperation is solicited.


