



ALMOST EVERY DAY someone inquires at The News office about the community hospital which McLean is (or was?) going to have. Frankly The News does not know anything If you had been on the small

That is, we don't have any late dope about it. The story up to date, as far as we know, is not long, and here it is:

Work to form a community cooperative hospital was first started, we understand, some time in the spring of 1946. A drive for members was made, and quite a few families joined, or agreed to join. Then interest lagged.

Interest was once again rejuvenated in the fall of 1946 and more members joined. Interest again lagged. Around the first of 1947, another drive was made, and the member ship increased to sligthly more than 100. Workers felt that the time had come when the membership was great enough to warrant considerable action

A permanent board of directors and officers were elected by the membership at a mass meeting. The directors then sought and received the aid of the city in buying a building at the former Prisoner of War camp. The building was bought for only \$100, and the city agreed to move it into town and place it on a lot selected by the board of directors, and then lease it to the hospital organization.

It is our understanding that a site was chosen, but the building was never moved in. As far as we know. it is still at the POW camp. It is also our understanding that other sites were advanced as possible locations, but nothing definite in the way of an agreement was apparently ever reached.

The News does not propose to point out whose fault it is that the affair has dragged along. It probably is the fault of the board of directors, but it might be the fault of the city officials. It might be the fault of The News for not mentioning it more often.

We really don't know whose fault it is that there is still no building here for the hospital. We do not know whether the hospital would even be successful. It might be, and then again it might not be-that would have

Regardless of whose fault it is that the affair has lagged, it behooves the members of the board of directors in our opinion, to do something-either get the building moved in and try to get the hospital going, or disband and refund the money paid in by prospective members Who knows-some of the people who paid for their \$50 membership might need the money if they are not to have a membership in a hospital.






