In reporting the results of a 16-year experiment at the station. Daniel pointed out that in addition to soil loss there were 32 times more water runoff on the experiment plots and that the continuous burning of native grass decreased the production of hay 54 per cent.

Fire protection is an essential management practice, Daniel says. Beside the loss of soil, water and decreased hay production there is some nitrogen lost through burning grass and vegetation. Fire destroys plant seeds and the vaiuable litter of organic matter underneath the grass. It lowers soil fertility and greatly increase: the possibility of soil erosion. h pointed out.
