

Alpha Chi is a national scholarship society whose purpose is to recognize and encourage high scholastic achievement by students of American universities and colleges.



The legislature will either have to cut expenditures or levy additional taxes, declares a report issued this week mage. The tacklers simply did by the institute, a statistical agency sponsored by the not tackle. South Texas chamber of commerce.

"The state government is taking in more money than ever before," says the report. "But it also is spending far mole than ever before. The last legislature appropriatec. all the money certified by the comptroller as available, including an accumulated surplus of \$52,000,000. A much smaller surplus will be available when the next legislature convenes. The difference will have to be raised by more taxes unless the lawmakers reduce expenditures.'

State government cost is increased 34 per cent in the fiscal year ended last August 31 over the preceding fiscal period to reach a total of \$319,988,101, the institute reported. It was the biggest year-to-year gain in history.

"This expenditure will be overshadowed, however, by the anticipated expenditure of more than \$450,000,000 for each year of the present blennium," the report added. "Demands for still more spending may be expected in the next legislature. Higher taxes will be difficult to avoid unless Texans alarmed by the prospect make their voices heard between now and January, 1949.

Upon death, payments which are made monthly to minor children and to widows with such minor children in their care are made without respect to the deceased worker's age.
