

TOO MANY PERSONS approach the choice of a family physician casually, according to Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer of Texas.

The trouble, says Dr. Cox, lies in the fact that too many prople view a doctor as they would a fireman-they wait until the emergency strikes before the doctor is called, just as they would wait until the fire breaks out before calling the firemen.

The state health officer does state, however, that such action may result in satisfactory treatment, but in the long run does not permit the supervision and close personal contact which can exist only by having a regular family

When a physician knows his patients, the doctor states, he is able to give advice on maintaining health and preventing disease, based or his intimate knowledge of the physical and mental make-up of the members of the family. The casually summoned physician plainly cannot have this background or opportunity. It is well known, the state health officer continues, to students of medical science that no one procedure or drug can be applied to

The idea of this article is not to get you to run to your doctor every day, but to pick out a doctor and stick with been followed. him. Let him study your case through a long period during the time when you are well. Then, if disease isn't ,




