Lovegrass Aids Eroded Lands

grasses for re-vegetation purposes on shallow, eroded lands is weeping lovegrass, Harley A. Daniel, project supervisor Red Plains Conservation Experiment station, said Experiments carried on at Guthrie by the Oklahoma A. and M. Experiment station in cooperation with the Soil Conservation service show that weeping lovegrass produced twice as much hay as little bluestem.

Weeping lovegrass produced 5, 009 pounds per acre while little produced only 2,41 pounds. These figures were determined by rod row samples and represent oven dry weights over a six-year period, 1941-1946.
