



## SOME UP SOME DOWN

There were more cattle, hogs and turkeys on Texas farms and ranches January 1, 1969, than a year ago but fewer sheep, goats and chickens, reported the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Cattle numbers were up 5 percent; hogs 1 percent; turkeys 6 percent while sheep numbers were down 7 percent; goats 18 percent and chickens 10 percent. Total value of livestock and poultry on Jan. 1 was placed at \$1,696.8 million, 12 percent above a year ago.
