Drunk Drivers Subject Of Talk

"So, How Do We Chew It?" is the title of a new illustrated talk that sets out in straightforward language the seriousness of the drunken driver problem in Texas by emphasizing that 68 per cent killed in one-car accidents, 45 percent killed in two-car accidents, and 58 percent of pedestrians killed were drunk when they died.
They illustrated talk recommends the adoption of a breath test law in Texas as an effective and a scientific means of combating the drunken driver problem.
Such a law, the illustrated talk points out, will set in motion the wheels to scientifically determine whether a driver is ill, has just had one or two drinks, or is too intoxicated to drive, thus removing the guesswork from the drunken driver problem that has in the past often made enforcement erratic or inefficient.
Illustrated with 32 color slides, the talk will be given to adult groups throughout the state. Green leaves may extend through the cauliflower head but, it is best to avoid heads that have spreading clusters. It indicates the head is overmature. Spotted, bruised or speckled heads are not a good choice unless they can be trimmed without too much waste, says Miss Wainscott.

As you select cauliflower, Miss Wainscott suggests looking for a solid, creamy, white head, compact and clean. Also look at the "jacket" the leaves should be bright and green in color, and fresh appearing.

Fresh cauliflower is reasonably priced this time of year, reports Jimmie Lou Wainscott, Gray County home demonstration agent.
Cauliflower, is a good source of Vitamin C, like other members of the cabbage family. It is sold either by the head or by the pound.

Another key is "First things first." For every family there are fixed items, payments that have to be met—rent, heat, utilities, insurance premiums. Then comes an emergency fund for the unexpected and the allocation for day-to-day expenses (food, running the household and the car). After these have been taken care of any workable plan includes an order of priorities for the distribution of money left over.

Perhaps the most important work in talking about spending plans is "attitude." The actual system adopted makes little difference. What counts is how well and how consistently it's used. It's no coincidence that financial troubles seem to haunt families that resort to a spending plan only in times of difficulty and abandon it until the next crisis appears on the horizon. A wiser course, is to use a plan for spending not as a remedy, but as preventive medicine for financial illness.

Vera Beall Butler recalls Mrs. S. W. Rice's recipe for stuffed peppers which is a masterpiece within itself. It reads: "To make 8 or 10 peppers, take 15c worth of hamburger meat. Mix crackers, eggs, salt, pepper, and a little chili powder. Stuff and bake." How many peppers would 15c worth of hamburger meat stuff at the present prices?

Vera also contributes a poem that is of interest: Though Grandma, as a super cook,—Was rated terrific,—The recipes in this old book—Are strangely unprecise.—It says "take ten cents" worth of this;—A penny's worth of that;—A pinch of salt; then (hit or miss)—Just add a little fat.—I'm sure if Granny lived today—She'd love our modern tricks:—So many things in boxes say:— "Just open up and mix."

Remember Elizabeth Byrd—the oldest of the pretty blond daughters of Tom Bird who lived near McLean for so many years? Elizabeth is now Mrs. D. J. Hartley of Plainview and has written us a very interesting and informative letter about the family of Tom and Laura Bird. Thank you, Elizabeth. The sheet from Dr. Donnell's registry of babies which contains your birth will come to you later.

And now a little "Lookin' Back" on my own family: When Mary Kate Tripp of the Amarillo Daily News reviewed "Feathers" she called us one by one until now there are only three. ### SOME UP SOME DOWN

There were more cattle, hogs and turkeys on Texas farms and ranches January 1, 1969, than a year ago but fewer sheep, goats and chickens, reported the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Cattle numbers were up 5 percent; hogs 1 percent; turkeys 6 percent while sheep numbers were down 7 percent; goats 18 percent and chickens 10 percent. Total value of livestock and poultry on Jan. 1 was placed at \$1,886.8 million, 12 percent above a year ago.
