Sun Bleaches Only As Clothes Dry

Long exposure of clothing to sunlight is bad because it tends to rot the material, explains Miss Dorothy Saville, household specialist at Oklahoma A. and M. College.

Cottons and linens bleach best when they are moist. It is advisable to lay clothing on clean grass to bleach because the moisture from the ground tends to

If clothes are bleached out in the sun, the specialist reminds to re-dampen them when they dry. Sun bleaching does the least harm to the fiber but it is slow and will not remove bad

Common chlorine bleaches are est for removing spots and however, they are more harmful to the fiber than sun bleaching. If chlorine bleaches are used it is important that the directions are read carefully and that they are used only on the fiber the bleach is recommended for. A notable fact is that such compounds deteriorate with age.






