City School May Get Gym From Air Field

An application for the gymnasium now located at the Pampa Air Field to be sold to the McLean Independent School District has been recommended for approval by the field representative of the War Assets Administration, Superintendent Logan Cummings, who has been negotiating for the building, announced Tuesday.

The large gym, 88 feet by 124 feet, is the one now at the Pampa Air Field, where most of the buildings and equipment have been destroyed surplus. It is similar to the gym which formerly was on the McLean Prisoner of War Camp grounds.

The recommendation for approval given to the local schools by the building makes it fairly certain that the McLean schools will get to buy the building, Cummings said, although it will be definite until the building is actually transferred.

The school district will receive a 95 per cent discount on the price of the structure, the superintendent pointed out. The field representative, who met with school officials of this area in Pampa Tuesday, did not know the exact sale price of the building, although the 95 per cent discount will make the first cost, it was explained.

Acquired by the local schools, the gym would adequately fill a long-felt shortage in athletic facilities of the school system. It is a large structure, with outside dimensions of 88 feet by 124 feet, and is equipped with shower facilities which would only require connecting for use.

Moving of the structure to McLean would, of course, entail the largest expense. Until the title is received, however, no bid on moving it will be taken.

The field representative told Cummings that information concerning the price, as well as the title, would probably be sent from the Dallas office of the W. A. A. within ten days.

Farmers Sent Questionnaires About Labor

The local Texas Employment Commission office in Pampa is now charged with the responsibilities of furnishing laborers to farmers and ranchers of the area, L. P. Fort, manager of the office, has announced. No charge for the service is rendered.

At present, the local office is sending out a simple questionnaire, with a map on the reverse side of it to locate farms and ranches so that help can be directed when the need arises, Fort said.

"All farmers and ranchers are urged to complete this simple questionnaire and return it in the envelope furnished which requires no postage," he explained. The maps and questionnaires are being sent to farmers in Gray, Hemphill, Roberts, and Wheeler counties.

Hess, Cummings To Aid in Study Gray Schools

Jake Hess and Logan Cummings of McLean have been named to membership on the Gray County advisory committee to study education, Senator James E. Taylor, chairman of the Gilmer-Aikin committee, announced this week.

At the time of notification, each member was mailed a copy of the committee's handbook, "Let's Look at Our Local Schools in Texas," as a guide to the county-wide study of the public school system.

Other members of the county committee are Huelyn Laycock, W. B. Weathered, Gene Green, Knox Kinard, Miss Margaret Jones, R. B. Nuckols, and Dr. Douglas Nelson of Pampa; Arlie Carpenter and L. R. Reeves of Lefors; and Pete Field of Route A, Groom.

The names of the persons appointed to membership on the county committee were submitted to the Gilmer-Aikin committee by local service clubs, civic organizations, and local school officials.

These committees are being established in every county in Texas primarily for the purpose of making a careful study of the local schools to ascertain the facts concerning the local schools for the benefit of the local citizens. Through the cooperative study, these facts, together with recommendations, can be transmitted to the state-wide committee for consideration in making recommendations for improving the public school system of Texas.

Stokely, Lander, Hibler Named To City Council

Voters of McLean went to the polls with a new record high for the number of ballots cast, approved by a margin of more than three to one the proposed city-financed recreation program, elected a new mayor for a one-year term, and chose three aldermen for two years each.

The surprising thing about the election was the heavy vote. There has been little "political talk" circulating around during the past few weeks, although interest began to increase a few days prior to the election. Last year's high of 396 votes was a record until Tuesday when a total of 329 votes were cast.

The recreation program, which carried by the overwhelming vote of 208 to 60 was expected to receive little opposition, although there had been some work against the 3-mill tax levy during the past few days. The main objection to the idea was that some taxpayers felt that the tax rate might be raised, although members of the city council had publicly stated that the levy would cause no increase in taxes.

The mayor's race was extremely quiet, especially since the interest which was created by the race a year ago. At that time, King defeated Meador, but there was considerable discussion on the seating of King as he had not paid his poll tax. King was finally seated as "mayor de facto" and served in that capacity during the past year. Slightly more than a month ago, the council held a special meeting, and decided to call the election for mayor, along with the alderman election, with the incoming mayor's term set at one year. King, Meador, and Ruel Smith were filed for the candidacy but Smith withdrew two weeks ago.

In the alderman's race, Stokely and Lander were seeking re-election. The other alderman whose term expired, John Cooper, did not seek re-election, and Hibler will succeed him in that capacity.

J. B. Caudill Buys Former City Cafe

J. B. Caudill announced this week that he has bought the cafe formerly known as the McLean Cafe, from Lewis Caudill. The cafe will be known in the future as the '66' Cafe, and will remain open 24 hours a day, Caudill said. He invited the public to come in and enjoy the food and service.

I would like to personally thank every individual who supported me in the past elections but as that is not possible, I will take this means of expressing my appreciation for their work and cooperation.

I am grateful for the privilege of serving the city for the past year; there are many projects that have not been completed, but I am sure that the new city government will complete those projects that they deem necessary for the welfare of the general public.

I want to assure the city officials that I am anxious to cooperate and help in any manner. They have my heartiest congratulations and best wishes for a successful administration.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The former Prisoner of War camp had been available through the C. A. A. to be used as an airport; the City turned it down as an unnecessary undertaking at that time. After assuming office, several individuals including officials of the various oil and gas corporations, asked that negotiations be resumed. The project was re-opened and as the result the City has received approximately \$50,000.00 in land, buildings, and equipment, including a chlorinator and a water-treating plant which will be used for the city water supply. The land obtained will be used as an airport. The need of such an airport is not particularly great at this time but as air transportation becomes more general, this airport will become more and more valuable to the town. This project necessitated several trips to Dallas, Pampa, and Amarillo, but now this land, buildings, and equipment have been obtained for the city as a gift from the government.

The City has purchased both the gas-line that ran from the Fowler well, and the water-line that ran from the Prisoner of War camp into town. The gas-line was converted into a separate gas main supplying the town. During the severe weather of the past months McLean was at no time in danger of a fuel shortage as were some surrounding towns. The new gas main will assure the people sufficient gas pressure at all times. A \$12,000 water well is under contract purchase pending examination of title, for the sum of \$1800.00 from the government. The City has been offered \$8,000.00 profit for the gas and water mains, but these items were bought, not to be sold for profit, but to be used for the benefit of the people.

For several years the citizens of the town had been wanting and trying to raise money to build tennis courts. The City built for them two concrete tennis courts and paid for them without additional taxation. Plans have been made to install lights for night playing.

A building has been moved into town and set on location to be used as a hospital building when the money can be raised to establish a hospital.

An audit was made, and the band money was set aside from the City's general fund, enabling the school to purchase uniforms and instruments without the school patrons raising funds from outside sources.

The City took out compensation insurance on all city employees. We felt this was a protection for the employees and their families as well as a protection for the city.

New signal lights have been purchased and will be installed as soon as they arrive.

There was a vigorous effort made to clean up the streets and alleys. The entire town was sprayed with a D. D. T. solution to eliminate disease and fly breeding spots. The State Health Officer made the statement that McLean was one of the cleanest towns in the state.

There are letters and records on file showing that the highway situation through the City is in good shape up-to-date, and as soon as the Highway Department furnishes the City with maps, the rights-of-way will be purchased.

A petition was presented by the voters from the south side of town asking for more paving. The majority of the council voted to table this request for further undertaking. I would have liked to stay in office long enough to have secured this pavement as it has long been needed. These people have paid their taxes and they are due the same consideration given to the other side of town. I, personally, secured six fire-hydrants to be used in the south side. Sufficient pipe was purchased under agreement to be used for installing these fire-hydrants. This will give additional fire protection and will reduce fire insurance rates for the people of the south part of town. Such fire protection was badly needed in this particular section.

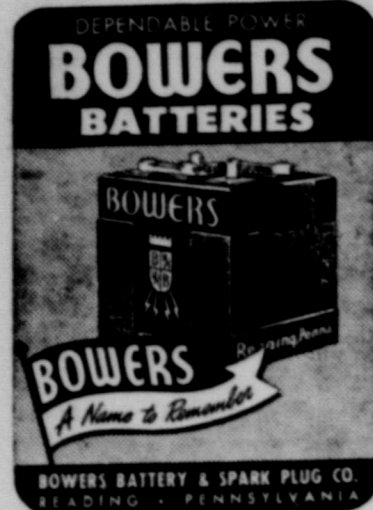
There has been criticism from some property owners because the City has allowed several small houses to be moved and set up within the city limits. The council was advised by an attorney that there was no way in which they could prohibit the moving of such dwellings, and that they could be located in any and all parts of town where there was lots available. We must remember that everyone has the right to own their home, and in these times of critical shortages and high prices, we should not be too critical if these particular homes are set up to standard. There is not one of these new property owners but what hopes and expects to improve the appearance of their homes just as quickly as they are able to do so.

Though serving only a short term, I feel that there has been a considerable amount accomplished. To be sure there has been some things not realized that I had hoped and planned to do, but on the whole the City has profited during my term in office.

A yearly audit was promised to the people of the town and that audit will be published before I leave office, showing all accounts and expenditures made during the past year.

I want to again thank all the people of the town for the privilege of serving the City, in the capacity as their mayor, for the past year.

Legislation to Enlarge Amarillo Vet Hospital Is Introduced

BY EUGENE WORLEY

Here's some good news for people of the Panhandle and especially for veterans. The Veterans Administration at Washington has finally agreed to recommend enlargement of the Veterans Hospital at Amarillo from its present 186 beds to 500 beds. It has been an uphill struggle to secure this favorable action but it is well worth the time and effort spent. This is YOUR hospital and the addition will greatly relieve the crowded conditions. In many cases, veterans from the Panhandle have been unable to secure badly needed medical attention at the Amarillo hospital and have been compelled to make long trips to other Veterans Hospitals.

I would like to thank the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and other groups over the Panhandle and neighboring states, together with a number of fine substantial individuals who have lent invaluable aid in our efforts to secure enlargement of this hospital. The resolutions and letters have been most helpful to me in preparing data to support our contentions that the hospital should be enlarged.

Last week I introduced legislation providing for 350 additional beds and other necessary buildings and equipment and authorizing an appropriation of \$3,000,000 for such construction. With an economy-minded Congress, the actual appropriation of the money for the construction of these additions will probably be difficult, but I expect to take this legislation directly to the Veterans Administration, Bureau of the Budget, and the President himself and make every effort to have it included in this year's appropriation. To anyone not familiar with legislative procedure, this is somewhat unusual but will be faster than the regular procedure. I feel the merits of our case justify every effort and with the continued help and loyal cooperation of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and all other interested parties, I hope the addition will soon become a reality.

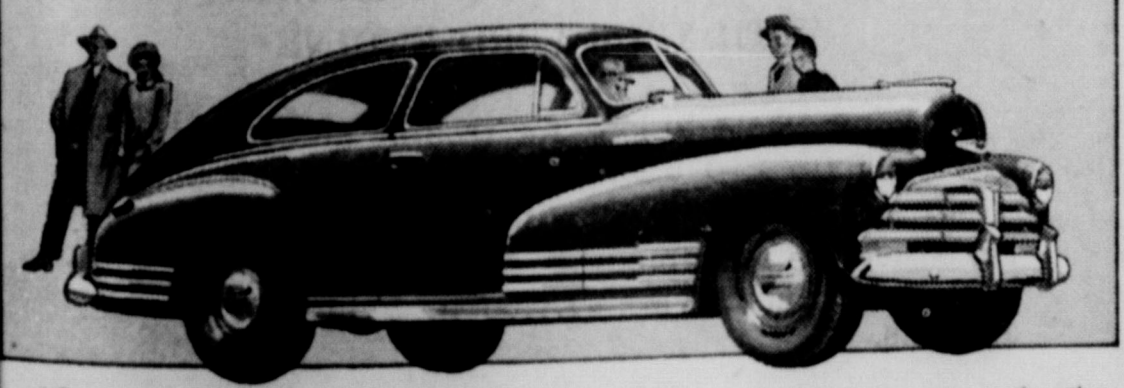

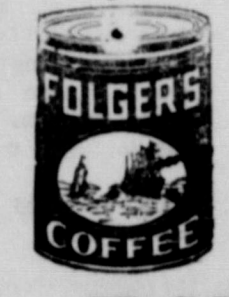

HOW WE TREAT OUR TEACHERS

ACCORDING TO FIGURES compiled by the Texas State Teachers Association (and we have no doubt as to their accuracy), salaries for our teachers are still far below the average earned by others who have undergone the same amount of training as teachers.

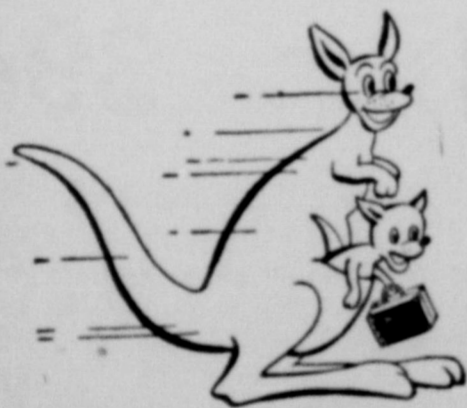
Furthermore, the association believes that Texas will still have a hard time getting sufficient teachers, because the higher costs of living more than offset the wage increases given by the last session of the state legislature.

Miss Emma Mae Brotze of Marshall, president of the T. S. T. A., says that the teachers are "grateful because the legislature provided a minimum salary scale of \$2,000 a year for teachers with degrees . . . but the fact remains, however, that Texas is still under the average pay for teachers in the United States and that increasing cost of living is forcing many people to look to other lines of endeavor for their livelihood."

Miss Brotze points out that figures from the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics show that the cost of living has increased 63.8 per cent since before the war. The average salary of Texas teachers, which is \$2,500, is equal to a pay check of \$1,526 in the 1935-39 period, but, with income tax deductions now, the average salary is equivalent to \$1,306 before the war.

"So long as high prices continue; so long as the federal government pays larger salaries for persons requiring college degrees, and teachers get less pay than semi-skilled workers, I do not believe the profession will appeal to the type of person we want to teach our children," Miss Brotze says.

Here's some more figures quoted by the association president: The federal government's lowest grade of pay in the professional field is \$2,691 (teachers' minimum wage for those with degrees is \$2,000); federal salaries in the professional class are as high as \$10,000 a year; the expenditure for education throughout the U. S. is only two per cent of the national income, as compared with six per cent in some other countries.

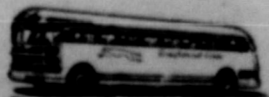

SAFETY HINTS

At the baseball game, you can't tell the players without a scorecard, and behind the wheel, you can't drive safely without knowing traffic laws and obeying them, according to W. J. Elliott, chief of the Texas Highway Patrol.

"It's as simple as that," he said. "You can't be a safe driver unless you are a smart driver—and you are not smart unless you know and obey traffic rules."

Captain Polk Ivy of the Amarillo district said that accident reports indicated left turns at intersections as one of the common situations which cause trouble because drivers do not know

the rules. As part of the nationwide "Know and Obey Traffic Laws" program in which the Texas Highway Patrol is participating, he listed the following things a driver should remember about right-of-way on left turns:

1. When you are turning left, you must give the right-of-way to a car in the intersection or approaching closely.
2. When you are approaching the intersection and a car which has been waiting in the intersection to turn left (then starts to make the turn) you must allow it to make the turn in front of you.
3. When you turn left, be sure you are in the correct lane and that you give a signal.
4. Don't insist on your right-of-way at the risk of an accident.

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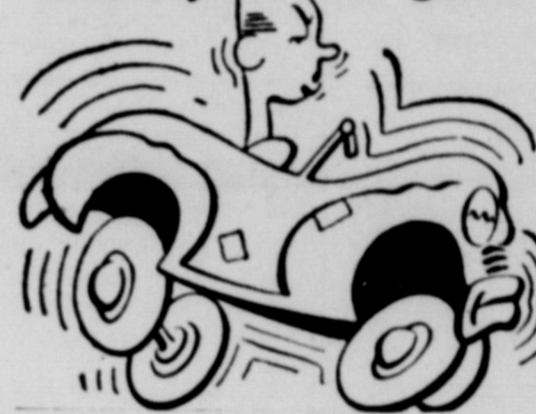
