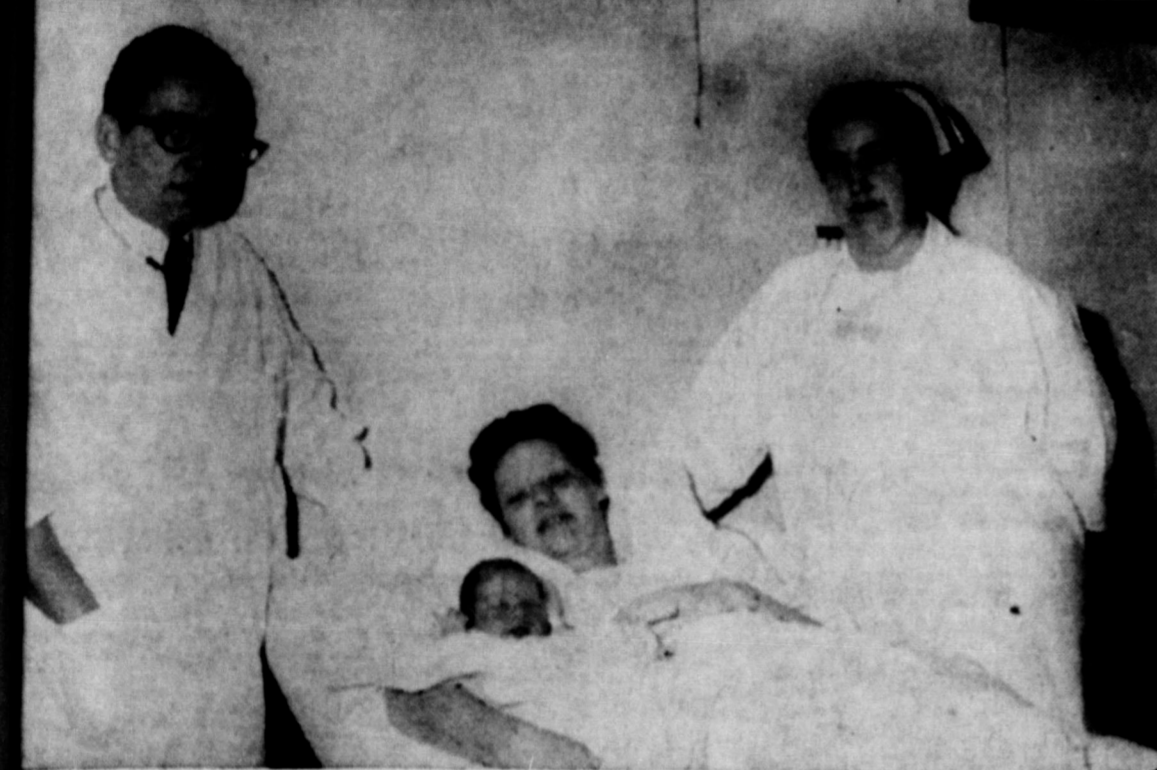

## SCHOOL BOARD WILL SUPPORT TSTA PAY BILL

Local Trustees Are Opposed to Plan Offered by Governor

The McLean board of education voted Monday night to endorse the Texas State Teachers Association-sponsored teacher pay-rise bill now before the state Legislature.

Supt. Jack Riley read information received from TSTA comparing its plan with the legislation proposed by Gov. John Connally.

The TSTA, under its "\$45 for '65" plan, would boost the salaries of public school teachers and administrators \$45 per month, or \$405 a year.

A bill introduced in the Legislature by Gov. Connally would provide an average increase for the next school year of \$184 per teacher, with automatic salary boosts during the next 10 years.

Riley said the governor's proposal would shift more of the cost to the local school districts than the TSTA-sponsored legislation, while not giving as much salary increase immediately.

### More Over 10 Years

Over the 10-year period, however, Gov. Connally's bill would provide more salary for teachers than the TSTA bill.

Using the formula furnished by the teachers association, Riley told the board of education that the increased local cost to the district next year would be some \$1,300 under the governor's plan.

If the TSTA legislation is adopted, there is a possibility that local costs would not be increased at all. The board could, if it desired, increase the teachers' salaries only by the amount of the pay boost provided by the state.

This is possible because the local district now pays teachers \$250 above the minimum salary set by the state. And the local district's share of the salary hike could be deducted from the \$250, if the school board felt funds were not available to meet its 20 per cent of the increase.

Eddy Windom, the McLean Tigers' top scorer in the basketball season completed last month, has been selected the most valuable player in District 2-A.

The honor was given to Windom by vote of the district coaches, who also made him a first choice for the All-District first team.

Due to graduate this spring from McLean High, Windom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Windom Jr.

He was a consistent high scorer for the Tigers, despite injuries during the season, and in one game totaled a big 45 points.

He will enter Texas Tech at Lubbock next fall on a football scholarship. Windom was the only member

of the Tiger squad chosen for the All-District team.

Other selections of the coaches were: First team—Archie Smith, Clarendon; David Moring, Clarendon; Mike Reynolds, White Deer, and Benny Eckles, Canadian.

Exhibitors from six counties entered stock in the Monday show.

The calf was bred by George Saunders, McLean Angus rancher, and fed under the supervision of Nelson Christie, McLean High School vocational agriculture teacher and Future Farmers of America advisor.

Mays is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Mays.

The McLean FFA chapter made the finest showing in several years at both shows.

Harry Tate, McLean FFA member and son of Mr. and Mrs. O. O. Tate, won the Showmanship Award in the Gray County show.

Young Tate took the award for his fine job of showing his pig in the county show.

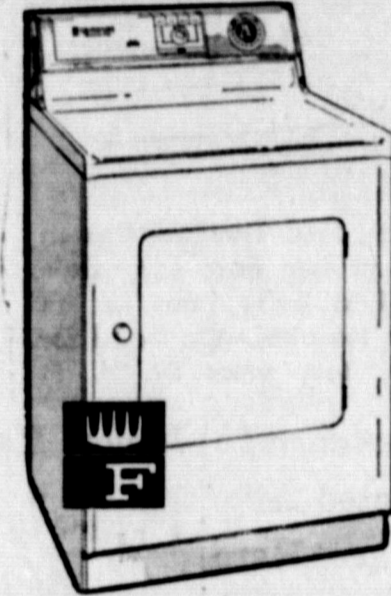

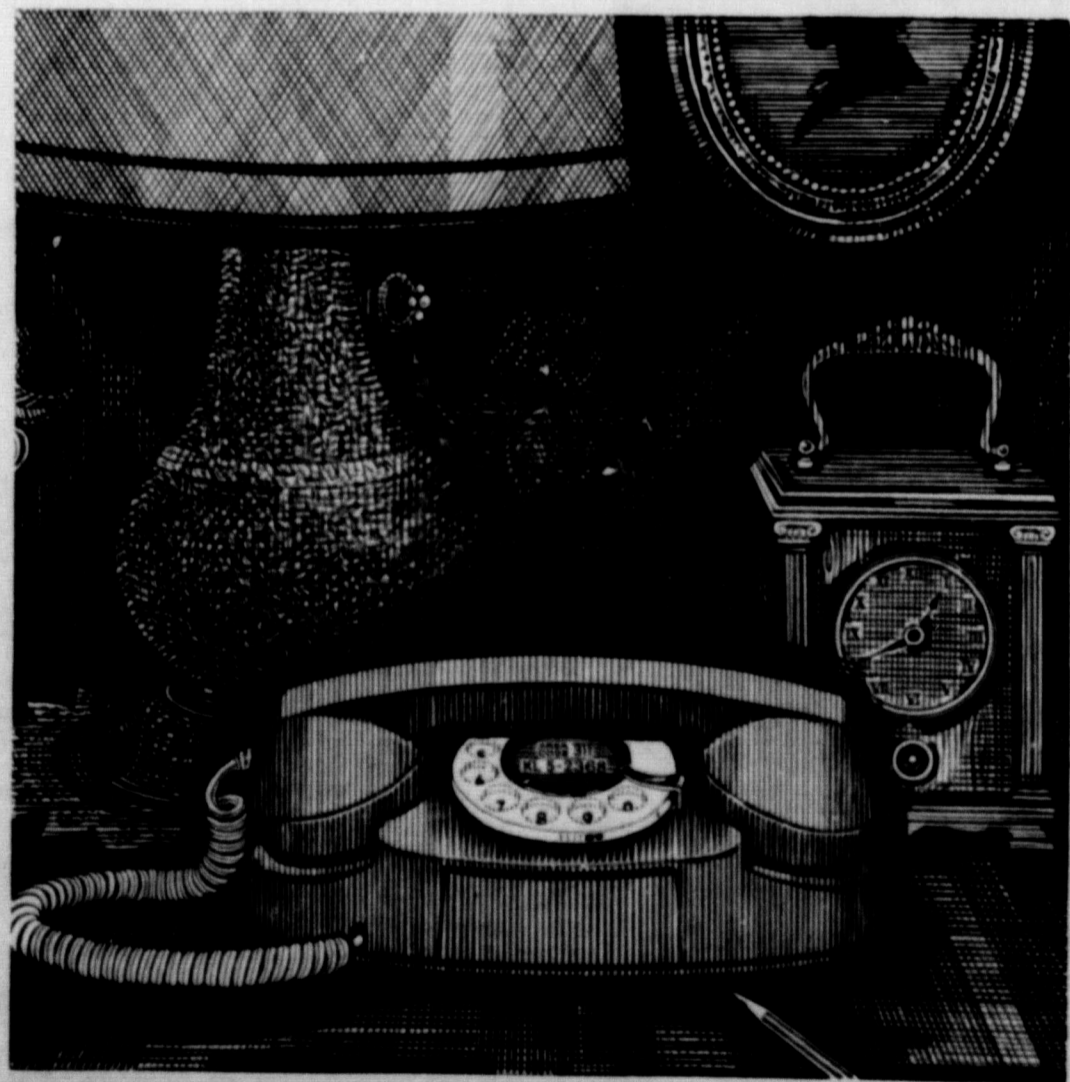

Turner Kirby has started leveling 30 acres of irrigated land on his ranch east of Groom.

Tom Anderwald has completed 15 acres of land leveling on his farm south of Kingsmill.

Abe Lewis plans to do approximately 80 acres of leveling on his farm east of Pampa.

Leveling land to uniform grade will evenly distribute irrigation and reduce tail water.

Truitt Johnson developed a 250-gallon per minute irrigation well on his ranch north of McLean. Truitt plans to irrigate 60 acres of alfalfa which will be established this year.

R. J. Bradley seeded a waterway on his farm south of Pampa. The waterway, when established to native grass, will safely dispose of excess water.

Mrs. D. I. Anderson completed a parallel terrace on her farm south of Pampa. Parallel terraces will eliminate rows and will satisfactorily conserve moisture and control water erosion.

R. W. Adams completed three diversion terraces on his ranch south of Kellerville.

Adams has started seeding 80 acres to native grass.

Eben Warner plans to seed approximately 350 acres on his ranch south of Lefors.

Lester Bailey has started seed-



to Rep. Grainger McIlhenny and State Sen. Grady Hazlewood asking their support of the TSTA bill. McIlhenny is one of the co-authors of the bill, having given endorsement through a questionnaire sent to each legislative candidate by the Texas State Teachers Association before the elections last year. Riley said Sen. Hazlewood has indicated support for the governor's bill.

TSTA-sponsored workshops to discuss the two proposals have been scheduled throughout the state. One will be held in Amarillo next Tuesday, and Riley invited members of the board of education to accompany him to that meeting.

**All Teachers Re-Hired**  
 All teachers in the McLean school system were offered new contracts for the 1965-66 term during Monday night's board of education meeting.

Re-hiring of the teachers for another year was recommended by Supt. Riley.

The board had also accepted a recommendation by Riley at the previous meeting that Jim Goss, junior high school coach, be promoted to assistant coach status at the high school with a raise in salary of \$500 per year.

Goss will assume the duties of high school basketball coach for the boys, in addition to his grade school coaching.

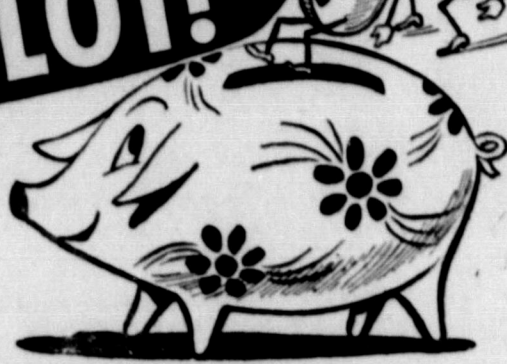

**WHY CALL ME LORD, LORD**

Luke 6:46

In I Cor. 1:10-13 Paul is beseeching or begging us to speak the same thing and that there be no divisions among us. We find in this same scripture reading some people wanting to be of Cephas or Cephasites, instead of just a Christian, and some wanting to follow Paul or be Paulites, but Paul asked the question—was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? The disciples of Christ are called Christians (Acts 11:26). Peter says we are to suffer as a Christian (II Pet. 4:16), not as a Paulite or Cephasite.

Since Paul is begging us to speak the same thing and not be divided, why, after reading Acts 2:38 where Peter said be "baptized for remission of sins," why should I say baptism isn't for remission of sins and you say it is? Acts 22:16 says be baptized and wash away your sins, but I say that baptism isn't necessary to rid me of my sins, and you say baptism is necessary. I read II Pet. 3:21 where Peter says baptism saves us, but some say baptism saves us and others say it doesn't.

I read in Matt. 16:18 where Jesus said, "I will build my Church," and in Acts 20:28 I read here about the "Church of my Lord that He purchased with His own shed blood;" and I read in Heb. 12:23 about the "Church of the First Born," and I belong to a church that I can't read about in the Bible. This causes me to feel bad.

My neighbor wants to study the Bible with me. He wants to study about the Lord's Church, says he is a member of the Church of the Lord. But I have read these scriptures and I know I am wrong, and I know he loves me, but I am not big enough to admit I am wrong yet. When I read II Tim. 4:3-4 I know it is because of false teachers that I am wrong. May we speak the same thing?
