

Duncan Named Head Mentor Grid Squad

Duncan, who has guided the Skyrockets to four district championships in football the past six years, was named as coach for the McLean Tigers during the next football season, at a meeting of the school board last Saturday.

Duncan, rated as one of the best coaches in the Panhandle in Class A and Class AA circles, will report for duty here on Monday. He will begin fall football practice sessions August 15. He will be here before that time. He is expected to meet with members of the football squad within a few days, to become acquainted with them.

Duncan, who has coached at Wellington for the past two years, and his teams have won four district championships, lasting out only to Shamrock in 1943 and 1947. His four district championship teams have won to win the bi-district of the four years, and to regional honors one year.

Duncan is coaching at Wellington. He has had 13 years experience in teaching in public schools. Meeting with the school board Friday night were Duncan and other prospects to fill the coaching vacancy created at mid-summer when Larry Sanders resigned to move to Canadian. The other two men were Clarence Lewis, now coach at Guyton, Okla., and formerly coach of the Canadian; and Byron Perry, who has been leading the football squad at Slaton for the past two years. Duncan will take over a Tiger squad which did not fare too well last season, but showed signs of ability in some of the games. He will have a particularly good array of backfield men, including Johnny Griffith, Johnny Jones, W. A. Bruner, L. M. Brown, Bobby Bruner, and Johnny Ward. Returning linemen include Brian Allen, Jimmy Newell, Jack Brooks, Bobby Kramer, McConghie, Vic Shelton, and McCracken.

Memorial Services To Be Held Sunday

Those who died in past wars of the United States will be honored in McLean Sunday morning. The occasion will be memorial services, sponsored by the McLean Lions Club, to be held Sunday morning in the high school auditorium, beginning at 8 o'clock.

The services are not to be like a funeral service, but instead the ceremonies are to remind the citizens of the U. S. of those who gave of their lives so that the democratic way of life might be preserved, it was pointed out.

The program, with Lester Campbell as master of ceremonies, will be as follows: "America," sung by audience; pledge to the flag, led by Lion Cub Claude Mounce; invocation, by Lion John R. Palmer; hymn by audience, "Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Highway 66 Hearing Now Set for June 3

Hearing of the suit of W. J. Ball et al vs. the State Highway Commission in district court, scheduled for today, has been postponed until Thursday, June 3, it was announced this week.

The plaintiffs, who are residents of Alameda and vicinity, seek an order restraining the commission from changing the route of Highway 66 that now runs through Alameda, to a point about one mile north of town.

A re-hearing in the case had been denied several weeks ago, but an unforeseen technicality caused the court to reverse its former decision and re-set the case for today, and now postponed again.

Plans for a mass chest X-ray survey to be held in Gray County August 24 through 28 were discussed in a meeting in Pampa Wednesday night.

The meeting, held in the county courtroom, was conducted by Philip W. Gauss, field worker of the state health department.

Attending the meeting from McLean were Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Allison, and Mr. and Mrs. Lester Campbell.

A mobile X-ray unit will be brought to Gray County by the state health department on those dates. Free chest examinations for all persons over 15 years of age who desire the service will be given. The unit, it was explained, is capable of handling 1,500 persons each day.

General Rains Over Panhandle Put End to Wheat-Killing Drouth

Three days of rainfall—Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday—brought an end to the spring drouth in the entire Panhandle area, and McLean's share of the moisture had totaled 2.02 inches by this morning.

The rainfall by days in McLean was Monday, 1.58 inches; Tuesday, .25 of an inch; Wednesday, .17 of an inch; and early this morning at about 3:45 o'clock, .02 of an inch.

Total for the month of May is now 2.37 inches, since 35 of an inch fell Sunday, May 16. The total for the year is now 6.84 inches, according to a report this morning from Pete Fulbright, local weather observer.

The rainfall had stopped this morning, and a heavy fog lay over the McLean area. Fair and warmer weather was predicted for the remainder of the week. Temperatures during the rainy spell dropped to as low as 52 degrees in the area.

Delegates for Demo Meet 'Uninstructed'

Texas delegates to the national Democratic convention will go "uninstructed" as to their choice for the presidential candidate, thereby allowing them to vote for the candidate of their choice.

This decision was reached Tuesday at the state convention held in Brownwood.

There were three factions striving for domination of the convention: the anti-Truman or state organization group; the state's right faction in harmony with the southern Democratic revolutionaries; and the pro-Trumanites.

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Two Injured In Car Collision

Two men were injured Sunday night at about 9:30 o'clock in a head-on collision of two cars about 3 1/2 miles east of McLean on Highway 66.

Injured were George Terry of McLean, who suffered two broken ribs and a fractured right arm; and Marshall T. Pace of Leveland, who received a broken leg and broken collar bone.

Terry was driving one of the cars and was accompanied by Pace. Names of occupants of the other car, bearing a Louisiana tag, were not available, although it was reported none were injured in the second car.

Rev. H. A. Longino, local Methodist pastor, left early this week to attend the Northwest Texas Methodist conference, which convened Wednesday in Lubbock. The conference will end Sunday.

Rev. and Mrs. Longino left Monday for Amarillo, where Mrs. Longino will enter St. Anthony's hospital. She plans to rest there for a few days before undergoing dental treatment.

Mrs. Longino has two embedded wisdom teeth which are to be extracted while she is in Amarillo.

The Northwest conference will be the 39th annual meeting of that group. Heading the list of delegates from the Clarendon district, of which McLean is a member, will be Dr. W. E. Hamilton, who is serving his first year as superintendent.

Executive Board Of Scout Troop To Meet Monday

The executive board of McLean's Boy Scout Troop No. 25 is to meet Monday night at 7:15 o'clock at the American Legion Hall to discuss the appointment of a new Scoutmaster, it was announced this week.

The former leader of the troop, Frank Pressler, has moved to Shreveport, La., and a successor is needed in the position. Assistant Scoutmaster Roy Kiser has been serving as acting Scoutmaster for the past two weeks, but has stated that he does not have the time to devote to the work in the future.

Judge Lumpkin Is Visitor Here

Judge James G. Lumpkin was a visitor in McLean Friday in the interest of his candidacy to remain as an associate justice of the seventh court of civil appeals at Amarillo.

Judge Lumpkin, a native of Amarillo, is the son of the late Dr. A. F. Lumpkin, one of the Panhandle's pioneer physicians. He graduated from the New Mexico Military Institute and the University of Texas. Prior to practicing law, he taught four years at Amarillo College.

At the time he entered the military service in 1940, he was an assistant district attorney at Amarillo. After serving with the 36th division, he returned home and was three times elected district attorney. Judge Lumpkin has been on the Court of Civil Appeals for more than a year. He is a member of the Amarillo Lions Club.

Judge Lumpkin said he expected to call on as many voters as possible between now and the July 24 primary. The court on which he serves has jurisdiction in civil cases over 46 Northwest Texas counties. It is composed of three members, one chief justice and two associate justices. Judge Lumpkin is one of the associate justices.

Mrs. Daisy Kennedy of Estelline Retired for 50 Years as Teacher

Mrs. Daisy Kennedy of Estelline, mother of Paul Kennedy of Amarillo, was honored in a short ceremony presented as a part of the graduating exercises for Estelline public school on the evening of May 19.

L. A. Tucker, former pupil of Mrs. Kennedy, co-teacher with her for 18 years in Estelline, and principal of Estelline public school, brought a fitting tribute to the stately, gracious-haired friend of children. Tucker stated that Mrs. Kennedy had kept her mind alert, body strong, and her spirit unflinching so that she might be worthy of the name teacher. Bruce, president of the graduating class, presented Mrs. Kennedy with an arm bouquet of flowers. Mrs. Kennedy re-

sponded with a short talk in which she stated that fifty years ago she began her teaching career in a one-room school house on a Wise County hillside.

She stated that she had had the privilege of teaching most of the members of her family and asked the following to stand with her: the daughter, Mrs. E. F. Kennedy, English teacher in Estelline High School; her son, Paul Kennedy, mathematics teacher in McLean High School; her niece, Mrs. C. E. Wilkinson of Estelline; and her grandson, Duane Kennedy of Estelline. All people that Mrs. Kennedy had ever taught stood in silent tribute and the response was met with resounding applause.

Superintendent J. B. Riddle stated that Mrs. Kennedy, a capable and untiring teacher after having served fifty years in the school room at minimum salaries, going through many hardships and pleasures in her work, was an inspiring teacher. 7. Cultivate in manner that when crop laid by the cotton row will be on slight ridge and middles practically level.

TWO THINGS

IN HIS ADDRESS to graduates of McLean High School last Thursday night, Dr. J. B. Boren, president of Hardin College of Wichita Falls, pointed out two things which he desired that the seniors remember.

The first of these two things was that seniors are not to consider themselves educated unless they are believers in God and the Christian way of life.

Dr. Boren explained that he has had students in his college say to him that they believe only in "stark reality," and that they do not believe in anything which is not material. A student, he said, was bisecting a body while studying biology one time, and remarked that he found the heart, the lungs, etc., but found no soul. Dr. Boren countered with the remark, "Then bring me a jar large enough to hold a mother's love." To this the student had no answer.

The Hardin college president pointed out, in an emphatic manner, that belief in God goes a long way in one's development in the future, and that no student is educated thoroughly until he finds room for spiritual belief.

The second thing which Dr. Boren stated he wanted the seniors to remember is that communism represents a dictatorship and tyrannical rule. He said that if he had the honor of serving in the Congress of the United States, he would, without hesitation, work to outlaw communism. He would make it as big a crime as murder.

The outlawing of communism, he said, would not necessarily drive it "underground." Already the strongest leaders of the movement in the U. S. are working underground. Making communism unlawful in the U. S. is the only sure way to eliminate the horrors which it might eventually bring to the democratic way of life now enjoyed here.

These two points were the main portions of the visitor's address and both should be remembered—not only by the 42 seniors of the graduating class, but by all the rest of our citizens as well.

mediate area, since only a few farmers go in for large acreages of the grain here.

In the large wheat-producing counties, however, the moisture will not do much good for this year's crop. In some of these counties such as Moore County, where 30 to 40 bushel wheat was common, this year's crop is expected to drop to 8 to 10 bushels to the acre.

Grasslands in this immediate area will be benefitted to a great extent. Ranchers had reported that there was still sufficient grass in the area, but due to the drought, the grass was not growing back after having been grazed by cattle. The moisture will therefore aid the future grass crops.

Cotton farmers were pleased with the rain, although the 140 inches which fell in the one-hour period Monday afternoon washed out some of the cotton which was only recently planted. It is not too late for the replanting, how-

ever, and the cotton farmers are generally well pleased with the moisture.

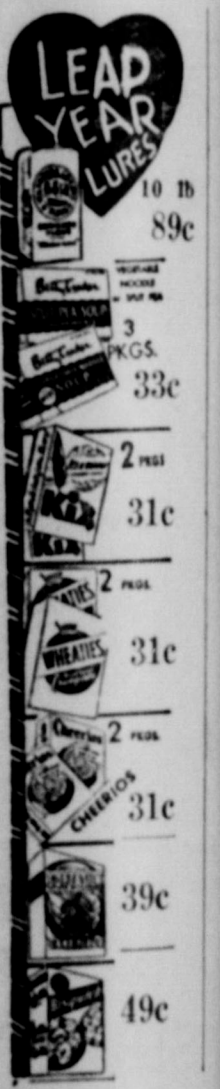
