Much of the wheat in the general area surrounding McLean, beginning to mature, and will be harvested within the next three or four weeks.

How high the yield will be in the area is not known, but most observers agree that more wheat will be harvested here than was expected a few weeks ago during the extremely dry weather.

Last year Jones, also representing the Allison company at that time, shipped 30 cars of wheat and 11 cars of maize from Mc-Lean, the first time in history wheat had been shipped that from here.


