NATIONAL POLIO RATE TAKES SHARP RISE

New York .- A sharp rise in the number of polio cases throughout the country in the last month was reported last week by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The institute announced it was preparing for possible widespread outbreaks in densely

populated areas this summer. Dr. Hart E. Van Riper, medical director, said 514 cases of polio had been reported in May, compared with 148 cases in May, 1947. The number of cases this year is 13 per cent above the same period last year, he said.

Recent cases, Van Riper added, already have exceeded the early rate of the 1946 epidemic. This year the most serious outbreaks have been in Texas, North Carolina, Iowa, South Dakota, and California.





In July, 1946, the Attorney General's office ruled that rates of all commercial hauling must be standardized and set within two years time. This has now been done, effective June 17, and we are in receipt of those rates.

Every commercial operator is furnished with the tariff rates, and all operators MUST comply with tariff. It will be the duty of both the truck and the man or firm for whom he is hauling to carry these rates out, or a penalty may be assessed on both parties.

These rates are too long and detailed for publication here, but upon request of the Railroad Commission or any carrier, these rates may be obtained.
