# On the 100-Bed **Hospital Bond Issue**

BECAUSE:

1. Gray County needs the 100-bed hospital.

2. By voting bonds for completing the 100-bed hospital as originally planned, the contract will be let July 1 if the bond issue carries.

3. Voting of the bond issue will eliminate the cost of revising the blueprints and plans for a smaller hospital.

4. 100 beds is more practical, as the same heating and serving facilities will be used in the 100-bed hospital as would be used in one of 70 beds.

5. Passing of the bond issue will not raise the county taxes more than 3 cents to 4 cents on the \$100 valuation.


6. If the bond issue is passed, the lowest bidder on the construction has agreed that actual construction will begin on or before July 7.




