Bruce L. Parker Wins Judgeship of County

Bruce L. Parker, present county attorney, was virtually promoted by voters to the office of county judge when he was nominated as the Democratic candidate over his opponent, John O. Pitta, Pampa businessman, in the second primary last Saturday. Nomination by the Democrats in Texas means virtual election, since a Republican or independent candidate in the state is a rarity.

Parker received 1,280 votes to 1,200 for Pitta, giving him a margin of 730 votes in the unofficial tabulation of ballots.

In the two McLean towns, voting on the judge's race was as follows: Precinct No. 1, Parker 58, Pitta 32; Precinct No. 11, Parker 82, Pitta 14.

In the other race which local voters faced, there is no definite decision. Both Coke Stevenson, former governor, and Lyndon Johnson, present U. S. congressman from the 10th district, have led at various times in their race for U. S. senator. At one tabulation by the Texas Election Bureau, only eight votes separated

the two totals. The race is one of the closest in the history of the state, especially considering the fact that nearly a million votes were cast.

Locally, Precinct 1 gave Stevenson 60 votes and Johnson 32. Precinct 11, the other McLean town, gave Stevenson 103 votes and Johnson 24. In Gray County, Stevenson got 1,220 votes, Johnson 1,000.

All results which are now appearing in daily papers and in radio reports are unofficial tabulations. Under the law, the election judges must report to the county Democratic chairman within 10 hours. Then the county Democratic committee certifies the results to the state Democratic committee. The state committee will meet in Fort Worth September 13, one day before the state convention, and certify the winner.

Since the unofficial results are sometimes not too accurate, citizens of the state will have to

R. N. Ashby, 72 Dies; Funeral Rites Held Here

Bob Ashby is dead.

Death claimed the pioneer and beloved resident of McLean Sunday morning. He had suffered a painful accident August 16, but just before he was believed to be showing improvement. A second accident, however, a blood clot ended the life of one of the early residents of McLean. Death came in the Green Hospital.

Robert Newton Ashby was born June 25, 1876, in Anderson, Logan County, Ky. He was 72 years, 2 months and 1 day of age at the time of his death.

Friends of the pioneer resident point out that he was not only a religious worker and devout Christian, but that he was a good man, too. One friend remarked that "Mr. Ashby was good to everybody."

He was a member of the First Methodist Church in McLean, and belonged to that denomination for 51 years. He joined in Kentucky before coming to this part of the country.

Ashby was married to Miss Nellie Turley December 21, 1896, and they moved to Indian Territory, now Oklahoma, in 1907. They settled near Hugo, Okla. In 1908, the family moved to Pampa, Tex., where they lived until January, 1938, when they moved to McLean.

For a while, he worked on the O'Dell Ranch, and then later the Paikler Ranch. Since 1938, he had been engaged in farming.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Nellie Ashby of McLean; one daughter, Mrs. Homer Wilson of McLean; two sons, Paul R. Ashby of Amarillo and Carl T. Ashby of Branson, Ind.; three brothers, W. T. Ashby of Fort Collins, Colo., John Ashby of Homer, Ky., and J. A. Ashby of Lubbock; and two sisters, Mrs. Lizzie Tyson and Mrs. Lula Coffer of Russellville, Ky.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Methodist Church in McLean, with Rev. H. A. Loggins, pastor, officiating, assisted by S. E. Jones. Burial was in Hillcrest Cemetery under the direction of the Womack Funeral Home.

X-Ray Unit Visit To Gray County Declared Success

The visit of the portable X-Ray unit of the State Department of Health to Gray County was successful throughout the county, according to a report from Pampa.

In McLean Tuesday of last week, a total of 428 people took advantage of the service.

The unit then moved to Pampa, and the following were the results of the visit there: Wednesday, 168 X-rays made; Thursday, 149; Friday, 128; and Saturday, 86.

The Thursday total in Pampa, 149, was a record for the service. Prior to the Pampa visit, the greatest number made by one unit in any one day was 140, according to technicians with the unit.

Registration of Students Begins At City Schools

School—or at least the preliminary part called registration—got underway today for students of the McLean High and Grade Schools.

Seniors of the high school were to be registered this morning, and juniors this afternoon from 1 to 4 o'clock.

In the morning, sophomores will register from 8 to 12 o'clock, and freshmen and 8th graders from 1 to 4 in the afternoon.

All grade school students from the 1st through the 7th grades will register today. Superintendent Logan Cummings has announced, and will not return to the school Friday.

Classes officially begin Monday. Buses are running the regular routes today and Friday, the superintendent said. The routes will be the same as last year, temporarily at least, and possible revised routes are worked out.

Teaching assignments have been made, and will be as follows: grade school assignments are subject to change, depending on the enrollment in each of the grades.

FIRST BALE!

McLean's first bale of cotton of the 1948 season was brought to town last Wednesday by George Preston of the Skillet community, about eight miles south of town.

The bale was ginned by the Planters Gin, and was bought by the gin for 10 cents per pound. L. H. Eachman, manager, said. No grading or classing had been done last Wednesday.

The bolls weighed 350 pounds, and produced a bale weighing 600 pounds, Eachman said.

Last year's first bale was not brought to town until September 22, and ginners had believed this year's initial bale would probably come later than that date.

Registration Under Draft Act Is Being Handled at City Hall

Registration of those eligible for the drafting into the armed forces under the Selective Service System began throughout the nation Monday, and in McLean 25 were registered during the first day.

Those eligible are being registered in the City Hall each morning from 8 to 12 o'clock and each afternoon from 1 to 5 o'clock.

Postmaster Johnnie Back, who is in charge of the registration, said this week. The postmaster explained that he was not informed of his duties until too late to have the information published in last week's issue of The News.

Registration dates are as follows: Today (Thursday) and Friday: Persons born in 1924.

Saturday or Tuesday (no registration will be handled on Monday, Labor Day): Persons born in 1925.

Wednesday, September 3, or Thursday, September 4: Persons

Kick-Off Time To Be 8 O'Clock At Tiger Field

Kick-off time will be 8 o'clock Friday night.

That's the time for the opening game of the season for the McLean Tigers, when they meet the Class B Groom Tigers at the McLean stadium.

The grid season got underway earlier this year, since practice started August 16, and after Class A teams such as McLean will play on to the state championship instead of merely the regional championship this year for the first time. Some of the teams will have one or more "post-season" games in making their way to the state finals, and therefore games are being held earlier throughout the state.

McLean will enter the game this week as favorites, due mainly to the fact that the local eleven is in Class A and Groom is in Class B.

Last year, the McLean Tigers defeated Groom at Groom by a score of 16 to 1. But this year the story could be different. Groom has most of its team of last year back, and the last year Groom edition was last, although light. McLean will field an experienced backfield, but will be somewhat short on experience on the line.

Sparking this year's backfield will be Johnny Griffith, Johnny Haynes, Jimmie Williams, and L. M. Watson. In addition, Coach A. Dunson has pulled Jimmy Newton, Tiger guard last year, to the backfield, and he is expected to see considerable action in that spot.

On the Tiger line will be Jack Brooks at center, and he has had two years of experience. Brooks and Griffith, incidentally, will be co-captains this season. Also on the line with experience will be Johnny Vineyard, Bob McConaghan, Leroy McCracken, Vic Shelton, and Charles Bailey. Bobby Kramer is already on the injured list, having received a bruised shoulder in practice last week.

Inexperienced men, but showing good promise, and some of whom will make the first string include Vernon Turner, Eddie Bob Jolly, Ray Middough, Marvin Henderson, Cliff Calahan, Earl Trimble, Ronald Litwell, Jerry Ryboe, Tom Ruby, and Charles Ruby. Backfield reserves include Donald Cunningham, Billy Ellington, Kenneth Cacter, Johnny Morris, Jack Bentley, and James Earl Richardson.

The team journeyed to Wheeler last Friday night for scrimmage practice. Against the Mustangs, who are boasting a much stronger team this year than last, the Tiger line showed up extremely weak. However, some of the larger prospects for the line had not reported for practice at that time, due to work, vacations, etc.

Lefors Corporal, Groom of Ten Days, Gray's 2nd Polio Fatality

Corporal Raymond Thomas Vanderbinder, 20-year-old bridegroom of ten days and a resident of Lefors, became Gray County's second polio fatality when he died at the Veterans Hospital in Amarillo Saturday.

The corporal was Lefors' first polio case of the year. He was united in marriage to Miss Alma Louise Curlett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Prechard of Lefors, August 17 at her home. The following Saturday he complained of a headache; however, his illness was not diagnosed as polio until physicians made the spinal fluid examination.

He was born in Pampa March 17, 1928, and graduated from Lefors High School in 1946. He enlisted in the army June 1, 1946, and had spent the past 15 months at Fort Richardson at Anchorage, Alaska. He was granted a furlough August 2 and arrived in Lefors August 7.

Meanwhile the 12th Pampa polio victim was admitted to the polio ward of the Plainview Sanitarium and Clinic Saturday morning. The victim is Joyce Vandenberg, 8-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Vandenberg. The family was at Eagle Nest, N. M., when Joyce became ill. She was taken to Tost, N. M., and then later to Plainview.

The 12th Pampa polio victim was Walter H. Myers, who is being treated at Plainview. He is suffering with the bulbar-type polio, and his condition is described as serious.

Four McLean Residents Hurt In Auto Accident Near Pampa

Four residents of McLean, and two from Borger, were injured early Tuesday morning when the car in which they were riding collided with a butane truck and semi-trailer about seven miles west of Pampa on the Pampa-Borger Highway.

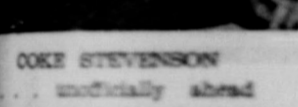

The six persons were taken to the Wurley Hospital for treatment, and at the last report were said to be recuperating as well as possible. The driver of the truck, James E. Newman, 21, of Plainview, escaped injury.

Mr. and Mrs. Willis had spent the night in Borger with their daughter, Mrs. Holman, and were en route to the Wurley Hospital to have their son's tonsils removed.

Willis, driving a 1942 Ford coach, was traveling east on the highway, patrolmen investigating the accident, said. The truck and semi-trailer was traveling south on a country road. The driver stated that he stopped at the intersection before crossing the highway, but Willis told patrolmen he did not see the truck until it was too late.

The truck was not damaged to any great extent, although the Willis car was badly damaged. It was taken to the Cuberson Chevrolet company in Pampa.

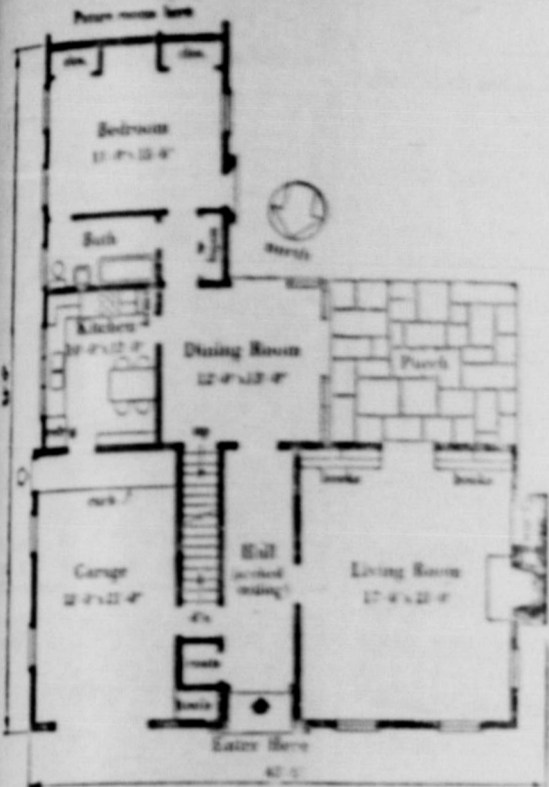
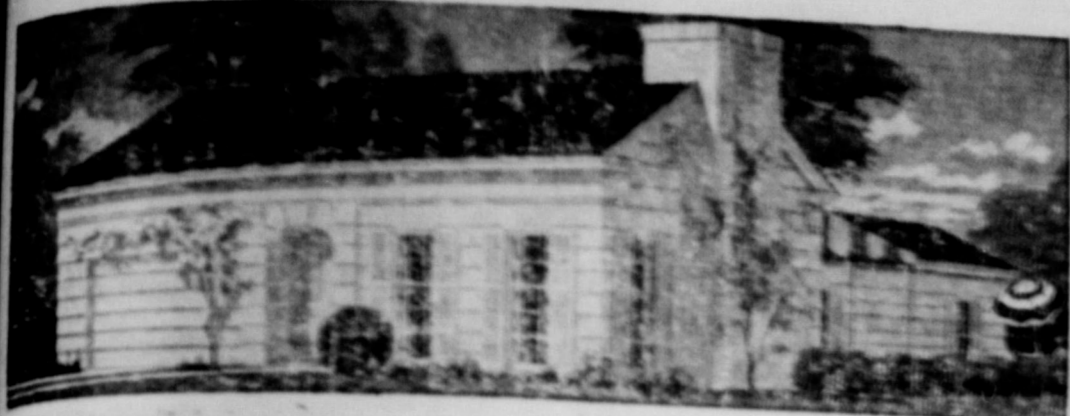

Pvt. D. B. Himes Now Paratrooper

Private David B. Himes Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. David B. Himes of McLean, qualified as a U. S. Army paratrooper on July 30, after completing five parachute jumps from an airplane in flight at the 11th Airborne Division Training Center at the Misaki Army Air Base located near Sendai, Han-shu, Japan.

The paratroop course consisted of calisthenics, tumbling, mock door training with a simulated airplane fuselage, 34 foot mock tower (which simulated the opening shock of a parachute), and suspended harness which shows the student how to control his chute while in the air. After finishing the first week of instruction, the student then makes five daytime jumps from an airplane in flight at an altitude of 1200 feet. After completing the two week course in parachute training the trooper is then entitled to wear the paratrooper silver wings and jump boots and draw an extra \$50 parachute pay each month.

Private Himes enlisted in the army November 26, 1947, at Indianapolis, Ind., and received basic training at Fort Knox, Ky. Upon completion of basic training, he was sent overseas and arrived in the 4th Replacement Depot where he was assigned to the 11th Airborne Division on Northern Honshu, Japan. He is presently assigned to Battery B, 67th Signal Field Artillery Battalion, 11th Airborne Division stationed at Camp Youngmans, Jimmachi, Han-shu, Japan.

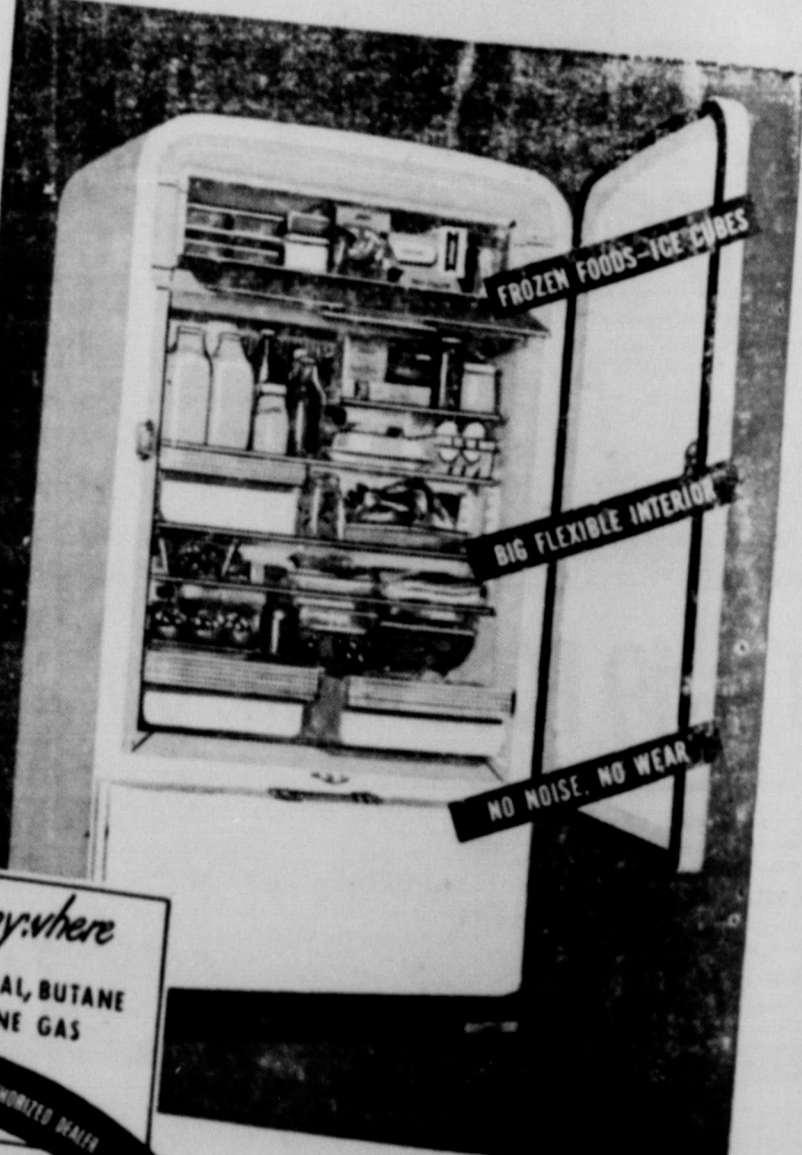

Public Urged To Make Cafes Keep Sanitary

The Texas State Department of Health cannot maintain daily inspection of all eating places and the public is urged by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, to insist on the proper sanitation of the establishment where they eat. If the public is careless in this respect the incentive to maintain clean food service will be lessened and operators will only maintain the level the public is willing to accept. He urged that the public patronize "eating establishments which measure up to a high standard of cleanliness."

The State Health Department is making every effort to improve sanitation of eating places. Dr. Cox said, and there is "no excuse for cafe owners not taking advantage of the food handlers schools which are being offered all over the state." He added that there are laws, rules and regulations which require the use of approved equipment and methods in such establishments.

"The public should be aware of these sanitary rules and regulations and insisted that restaurateurs observe them. Patrons should realize that tables and counters will be many times cleaner than the kitchen and other places out of sight," he warned.

He urged milk appraisal by the patrons also. Texas law requires that a milk bottle cap state the grade of milk, and whether it is raw or pasteurized. "Insist on having milk served in its original container, with a covered cap and a legal label," Dr. Cox advised.

"Obviously," he said, "the best in sanitation can be had only by close cooperation between the public and the investigators of the State Health Department."

Pre-Trial Court Procedure Used

Judge Luther Gribble, presiding judge of the ninth administrative judicial district, put to test the new pre-trial procedure in a hearing held in Clarendon August 26.

The pre-trial procedure is coming into wide use throughout the entire United States and is hailed one of the greatest advances in expediting trial of lawsuits. The attorneys representing the parties to a lawsuit have an opportunity to agree on the undisputed facts to be presented in the trial of the case and have the court rule on the law involved.

Without infringing on the individual's rights, pre-trial cuts out most of the red tape and endless delays sometimes encountered in trials under the old procedure.

Judge Gribble said, "The pre-trial conference is a notable improvement in court procedure and I hope that in the future it will be more consistently used throughout this area."
