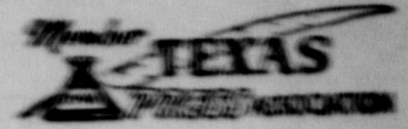

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Memorial Rites Set Today for Andy Corbin

Memorial services will be held this afternoon at the First Methodist Church in McLean for Andy Corbin, one of the first local residents to die in service during World War II. The young T. S. Whittle died at the T. S. Naval Air Station in Dutchman Station, Texas, June 1, 1942, only a few months after the opening of the war. He was killed following his death in an aviation cemetery. Corbin was born in McLean July 28, 1912, and was 29 years, 11 months, and 4 days of age at the time of his death. He attended the McLean school, and had lived here all his life prior to his entry in the service in 1941. He was a member of the Third Legion, T. S. M. C. before enlisting in the service, he was engaged a lifetime. Survivors include the parents, Meredith T. Corbin and Lilly Ann Corbin of McLean; three sisters, Mrs. Louis Lee Boyd of Comanch, E. E. Miss Jeanie White Corbin and Miss Tina Margaret Corbin of Denver, Colo., and two brothers, James E. Corbin of Denver, and Troy E. Corbin of McLean. Pallbearers will be Spencer Brown, C. E. Lee Jr., Johnny Merial, Gene Greer, Jack Slaughter, and Bill Day. Burial will be in Hillcrest Cemetery under the direction of the Warrick Funeral Home.

50 Bales Ginned Here As Harvesting Opens

More than Dollar Down Now Needed To Buy Many Items. The cotton gin, after seven and a half days, started ginning today—4 a.m. for a time. New bales are being made in a effort to speed marketing. In general, the cotton requires a one-third down payment in cash or notes, and a one-fifth down payment on the other items to which they apply, providing the selling price is over 20. If the balance due after the down payment is over \$200, it must be paid off in 3 months, with a 5% minimum monthly installment. If less, it must be paid in 2 months. In other words, big payments won't be quite so easy, although they won't be stretched out over quite as long a period.

Pulling to Get In Full Swing In Short Time

A word of the bales had been ginned in McLean by the 20th of last week, the crop gin in Gray County, by Wednesday afternoon from the crop of 1948. Cotton planters that they expected the cotton to begin coming in faster daily, as field pullers begin to show up in the area. Present indications are that there will be a shortage of labor in the cotton harvest. E. B. Jones, who is buying cotton for a Fort Worth concern, stated that he has already bought 100,000 bales. The grain is now in the ground, due to a shortage of men for plowing. Most of the cotton coming in so far is averaging 50 bales, but the grade has been reasonably good. Most of the early-pulling cotton so far has been spotted. Local cotton prices range between 20 to 25 cents per pound, depending on grade, in many cases, the local value is greater than the present market price. The government's loan figure this year stands at 100 cents per pound for marketing in 1948, the base price and stage. Local values range slightly above for better cotton and decrease for poorer cotton. The profit in the area—which includes some from Denton, Chapparral, Wheeler, as well as Gray County—is expected to be slightly above 1947 value. Last year the area produced only about 1,000 bales. Cotton here is generally good, better looking and will produce more than some of the other areas where cotton is not so much the major crop. Average in cotton this year is also slightly greater than last year.

Right-of-Way Committeemen Receive Papers

The committee appointed by County Judge Sherman White to lay the right-of-way for widening of T. S. Highway 84 has received all necessary papers to be signed with the work, it was announced this week. Members of the committee are Ed Lander, G. G. Stoney, and C. E. Owen. Papers necessary to lay the right-of-way include contracts, deeds, etc. Lander said, and the committee is interested in getting the work completed as soon as possible. Bonds have been said by the county to lay the right-of-way a total of \$22,000 in bonds were sold recently, and part of this money is to be used for Highway 84, and the rest for Highway 74. In the case where structures are to be moved to make way for the water highway, lump sum payments are not to be made, Lander said. The contracts call for marking the structures to new locations, setting them up on suitable foundations, and making repairs necessary caused by the moving. In addition, damages will be paid, including the cost of the land through which the highway will go. The right-of-way will be bought at first from the Wheeler County line and to a point 17 miles west of McLean. At that point the highway dips into Denton County, and a few miles farther west again returns to Gray County. A number of land owners on the proposed right-of-way have already been contacted, it was explained.

Tigers Down Panhandle 19-0 for Third Win of Year

Led by hard-driving L. M. Watson and starting Johnny Griffith, the McLean Tigers racked up their third victory of the season on the gridiron when they defeated a spunky Panhandle Panther eleven 19-0 Friday night on Tiger Field. Watson vent over from the 2-yard stripe for the first marker, and from the five for the second. Griffith tore through the right side of the Panther line from the 25 and roared for the remainder of the distance for the third touchdown. Johnny Barnett, who also turned in several nice runs, kicked his second try for placement through the uprights for the extra point. Statistically speaking, McLean played a much better offense game than did Panhandle, running up 23 first downs to only five for the entire Panhandle effort. A much stronger team than had been expected, but never seriously threatened to score. The Panthers got to the McLean 20-yard line, only to fumble and see Vernon Turner Tiger tackle, recover the ball. Later they made it to the McLean 40, and three Jimmie Newton intercepted a pass. There were plenty of hand-offs at the McLean line—Jack Brooks, Turner, Johnny Barnett, Bob McCormick, and Bobby Bruner. It was done again a second pass each, and that treatment paid off well. Griffith was again the biggest ground-gainer. He carried the ball 19 times, netting 98 yards to give him an average of 5.1 yards per run. He also returned three kicks, for 21, 24, and 22 yards.

Watson came in for his share of the running too. He carried 10 times, gaining up 81 yards, scored 12 points. His average was 8.1 yards per run. Watson is an extremely hard runner, good for 100 yards in 10 runs, but little by little he carried the ball. Griffith ran with the ball from scrimmage the three times, netting 23 yards, kicked one placement for an extra point. He has run of 23 yards more at a quarterback would pay. Griffith picked up one yard, then made 11 around left end to put the ball on the 25. Watson carried over to put the ball at the 20, and Griffith took it to the 15. Watson went to the 10, and Griffith to the 5, and then Watson plunged through the middle and over. Griffith missed the placement and the score was 14-0. In the second quarter, Turner recovered 24 yards, then carried to the McLean 11. Griffith failed to punt, and Watson carried through to the 40. Griffith went to the 40 for a first down, Watson ran across to the Panhandle 20. On the next play, Griffith went to the 25, but McLean was penalized to take it to the back-

field in motion. Griffith found a hole in the right side of the line, and went to the 20 for a first down. From there Watson carried to the 11, and Barnett was caught for a loss of three yards to put the ball back on the 14. Griffith then started left end to the 10 from where Watson plunged it over on the next play. Barnett made the kick good, and the score was 19-0. In the third quarter, McLean barely mounted again. Starting with the ball on the McLean 25, the Tigers marched to the Panhandle 20. From there Griffith carried a beautiful pass into the arms of Bobby Bruner across the goal line. The play was called back, however, and McLean penalized to the 20 for backfield.

"Heretofore, the sergeant said, 'only men with prior service (veterans) were eligible to go to Europe. However, we are now authorized to accept anyone from civilian life with or without prior service for the European theater.'"

Period of enlistment will be for 3, 4, 5, or 6 years, whichever one the applicants wish to choose, the sergeant added. Sgt. Jewell also announced that in addition, the War Department has authorized a program to enlist men for direct assignment in the famous 1st Infantry Division or the United States Constabulary Forces, Europe assignment respectively. This opportunity exists only from September 1 through November 30, he said. For detailed information concerning the new policy, Sgt. Jewell can be contacted in McLean on Monday of each week.

A total of 2,971 men had registered at the various offices of Selective Service Board 52 through Saturday, the final date for registration for the draft.

Local Board 52 covers offices in Pampa, McLean, Miami, Wheeler, and Clarendon.

Of the total number, 441 have already been sent, or will be sent, questionnaires.

Texas has been called upon to furnish 670 men in the first draft in November, although Board 52 had not received their quota the first of this week.

This state will route 1,400 men through pre-induction physical examinations in October, according to the state director of the Selective Service. A 40 per cent turn down is anticipated in the first examination.

Beginning last Monday, youths attaining their 18th birthday are required to register not later than five days after their birthday.
