or in dismantling the building and setting it up here.

Council members called an election several weeks ago to vote bonds, the money from which was to be used in moving the surplus building. 



the taxing provisions of the Social Security Act are identical with those covered by the benefitfrom L. P. Herndon, collector of Social Security Administration in Amarillo.

The regular quartely social seculty tax returns and wage reports for the calendar quarter ending September 30 are due in Internal Revenue, Dallas, by the end of October. For the sake of economy in the government, and to simplify reporting of employers, the two agencies use the same reports to secure needed information.

Both officials strongly recommend to employers that the name and account number of each new security card when he starts to work. 'To do so will enable an employer to file correctly compiled reports," they said. "As a result, time and expense will be saved the government, and inconvenience and possible penalties can be avoided by the employer In addition, all workers will be sure to receive full wage credits towards the retirement and famly insurance which they earn."

The statement by Herndon and Sanderson concluded that "a great majority of employers have ione an excellent job of reporting. The few who have not done so are now expected to comply fully with the requirements."
