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


quate on practically all of the ranches. Construction of some additional earth dams would be of some benefit for stock water. and more especially from an erosion control standpoint.

Use of temporary pastures such as sudan or Johnson grass during the summer growing season, has been helpful in many in allowing the permanent pastures to be rested during the The ranchers realize summer. to help prevent run-off, that burning the pastures is to maintain the vigor of harmful to the better grasses and most of them are following the recommended practice of plowing

Trails should be made to see if fertilizers can be

to McLean in 1938 from Burkburnett. He lived here for some time before moving to Dumas, from where he enterd the army.



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
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
