### Railroads and Roads

Very little adjustment seems to be needed from an erosion control standpoint. Control measures are needed in many parts of the district, however, for such noxious ing cultivated land. Surfacing, or other improvement of farm-to market roads, would be quite helpful to farmers in marketing their

There is only a very limited acreage of land, and this lies chiefly along McClellan Creek. which could be used economically for irrigation. The only systems now in use are small, shallowwater type, and no complicated problems have occurred in connection with their use. Public Lands

The only public lands are the McClellan Creek Land Utilization Project, consisting of 1,500 acres, and the Pampa Army Air Field, and three auxiliary landing field which, together, include about 800 acres. There is no particular erosion problem on the McClellan Creek project since the native grass area is grazed in such o way as to leave enough plant residue to protect from erosion. The cultivated areas on the air base are farmed by private operators in the same general manner as other cultivated lands in the district. Areas on these bases not in cultivation are protected satisfactorily with native vegetation.







### **Rabbits Cause Tuleremia**

Tuleremia, or "rabbit fever," is transmitted to human beings through the careless handling of wild rabbits, and according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, every wild rabbit should be handled with extreme care from the time he is bagged until he is placed on the table.

"If a rabbit is diseased, careless handling can cause tuleremia. This serious disease is transmitted from rabbits to human beings, usually through direct contact with the infected animal or with objects contaminated by the meat or fur," Dr. Cox said. "Each year many persons contract tuleremia because they fail to use proper precautions in the handling of the rabbits which are killed for food."

first precautions recommended is to shoot only the healthy rabbits with enough energy to run away

tional Pillsbury prize at Minnear olis, Minn., next spring.

### **Doctor Warns** Of Pneumonia

A statement from Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, discloses the fact that 2,531 Texans died from pneumonia during the year 1947, and emphasizes his often repeated warning that this disease is a killer. Pneumonia is caused by the

pneumococcus germ which is present in the bodies of almost everyone, and ready to start trouble if the resistance becomes lowered for any reason. We can build up our resistance by avoiding undue fatigue and unnecesary exposure to extreme weather conditions, Dr. Cox said. When we go outside in cold weather, sufficient clothing should be worn to keep the body warm. Keeping the temperature of our homes and offices as low as is consistent with comfort will greatly lessen the difficulties encounteerd in adjusting ourselves to the cold when we leave the

Another method of prevention in pneumonia is to never neglect a cold, for the common cold often opens the door for pneumonia if it is neglected. A person with a severe cold should stay at home and call his phyiscian for advice, temperature persists and the cold lingers on. He should follow his physician's advice until the cold has entirely disappeared.

Another advantage of consulting physician when suffering from a cold is the fact that what the patient mistakes for a severe cold may be beginning pneumonia. If this is the case, the doctor will have an opportunity to begin treatment early, which adds materially to the patient's chances
