OUR SCHOOLS

NO DOUBT many of the readers of this paper noticed a recent letter to the editor concerning our school systems -the inadequacy of tacilities and of teachers.

The letter was written by a mother of some of our local school students, and was written, we are certain, in all earnestness.

The writer, Mrs. Orphus O. Tate, stated that "there are too many children for the number of teachers in the Mc-Lean elementary school." She also stated that she was well pleased with the present teachers, but felt that there simply are not enough of them. Mrs. Tate wants to know the ideas of other parents in the district toward correcting this situation, and she also would like to know is any kind of a nice fellow at how the teachers feel.

This is not any attempt to answer Mrs. Tate's letter, very, very few people who have ince we agree with her on the lack of teachers. This, instead, is merely a discussion of the situation.

Under the present set-up, unfortunately the same situation prevails in almost every school in Texas, as far as can be ascertained. The state legislature sets up a club is \$5. 
