1.25-Inch Rain Falls in McLean In 34 Minutes

Several buildings, oil derricks, and a few homes were damaged late Wednesday when a tornado ripped thru oil installations and homes in the Kellerville area at about 6:30 o'clock.

The tornado apparently struck the Warren Petrol-Corporaton gasoline plant first, and with its most most destructive force. Roofs were ripped off of several buildings at the plant, Don Alexander, plant empolyee, reported this morning.

A number of trees were uprooted. Operation of the plant was continued, however, after a small amount of "patching up," he said.

The tornado then progressed to the Royal Oil company installations where it knocked down a garage, and uprooted more trees. twister continued north, struck the Texas company plant, removing the root from that plant. Several derricks were also knocked down and an engine room was hit.

It was also reported that some Shell company derricks were destroyed by the

Two homes were reported damaged. One was the home of Rol Higdon, where one room was torn off. of the family were hurt. The other home, that of the Clifford West family, lost its window screens and some outbuildings. The family saw the storm too late to get to the cellar, but escaped injury.

The Kellerville storm was preceded by rain and hail. In McLean about the same time, the storm signal was given as a very heavy cloud approached from the southeast. The cloud had all the appearance of a damaging hail storm, but little hail fell in McLean. The rainfall added another .31 of an inch in moisture to bring the week's total to 3.01, and the year's total to 13.28.

Just outside the city limits of McLean, at least two barns were blown down. One was that of Ercy Cubine and Bob Sherrod, just west of the city limits and the other that of John B. Rice. also west of town. Some damage to wheat in

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





Cancer Drive Short of Goal; Time Extended

during 1949-50 may be sharply curtailed and cancer education, service, and research in the state seriously retarded until more Texans are given an opportunity to contribute to the 1949 drive for funds of the Texas Division, American Cancer Society.

This statement was made thi week by Karl Hoblitzelle of Dallas, state campaign chairman for the American Cancer Society. when announcing the extension of the Society's April membership drive into May. "We are still short of our \$450,-

000 goal," Hoblitzelle said, "and, unless our campaign workers are allowed more time to see contributions, cancer control work in Texas will be sharply curtailed. "Our carefully-budgeted program

indicates that \$450,000 is the minimum needed to advance the Texas fight against the nation's No. 2 killer, which this year probably will claim the lives of more than 7.003 Texans.

"Our cancer fight calls for fund: to support research, professional education for doctors and nurses, information centers, and many other phases of cancer control. and funds are sorely needed to continue the work," the state campaign chairman said. "For this reason I am asking all of our workers to continue their campaigns."

Hobiltzelle urged all Texans who have not yet contributed to do so by sending their donations to: "Cancer, care of postmaster in their own city or town," or by sending them to their own county unit.




