## First Area Wheat Cut; Rains Delay Harvest

The first wheat in the McLean area has already been cut, it was reported Wednesday noon in The News, but up until that time none had been marketed here.

Too much rain has been the bane of most all farmers. Those with wheat are suffering the most, since the wheat has been showing signs of rust, has been knocked down in some spots, and also has been hard hit by the growth of weeds.

The first wheat cut, according to the report received by The News, was high in moisture content. In addition, the grain had a great deal of weed stuff and other such materials in it, and, if sold, will be docked accordingly.

The moisture has continued to fall in the area during the past week, with an additional 1.14 inches falling since last Thursday, according to a report from Pete Subright, local weather observer.

Thursday of last week, a light shower brought .04 of an inch, Friday another .65 of an inch, and Saturday found .04 of an inch falling. Early Monday morn-

ing, shortly after midnight, the storm warning was sounded in McLean, and soon after 21 of an inch fell. More rain fell later Monday, bringing 30 of an inch.

The total moisture falling for the year is now 15.86 inches.

Storage for wheat has been the big problem throughout the Panhandle as harvesting is getting underway. The market price is below the government loan price, but farmers have been required to have approved storage facilities before the loan can be obtained. Now, however, the government has relaxed this ruling, and will allow the farmer to store wheat on the ground and obtain the loan, providing he has proper storage constructed within 90 days.

The West Texas chamber of commerce has appealed to Washington for not less than 100,000 surplus army tents and/or tarpaulins which could be released to farmers to store their grain. The WTCC stated that the tents could be made into suitable storage, thereby meeting the government requirements on storage.

## Burglars Take About \$150 From Office of McLean Gin

A burglar or burglars entered the office of the McLean Gin some time during the week-end, and made away with a total of \$150 to \$300 in cash and checks.

R. R. Jones, manager of the gin, stated that he was not cer-

tain of the exact amount of money stolen. The cash totaled about \$150, and several checks were in the stolen property.

The office was entered by knocking out a window in the small building on the gin yard. The money was in an unlocked safe, Jones stated, and the cash drawer was taken along with the money.

Time of the robbery has not been definitely established. The money could have been taken either Saturday night or Sunday night, Jones and Deputy Sheriff Charley Nicholson said.

## McLean Nine Downs Claude By 10-7 Score

The McLean baseball team won its second game in five starts Sunday afternoon when the local nine downed Claude 10 to 7 in a tilt on the McLean diamond.

Douglas Groves hurried for the winners.

## Library Gets New Machine For Bedridden

The ceiling projection machine, bought recently by the McLean chapter of the American Red Cross, has been delivered here and will be loaned to those in need of it, through the public library.

The machine is designed so that bedridden people may use it for convenience in reading. Micro-films have been made of various books. These films are inserted in the machine, and the reading matter projected on the ceiling of an ordinary room. The reader can change the pages after reading by the simple process of pressing a button. Should the reader desire to return to an earlier page, the machine can be run backward until the desired page is reached.

Mrs. Lady Bryant, city librarian, will be in charge of the lending of the machine. She has worked out a system for loaning it similar to the manner in which books are loaned. A limit on the amount of time it may be kept will be made, so that the service will be available to as many as possible.

A total of 47 films, or books, were ordered with the machine, and arrived with it. Many of the books are popular fiction. In addition, there are comic books for youngsters, and non-fiction for those who desire them. Included in the list of books are "Peace of Mind," "The Green Years," "One Foot in Heaven," "Little Women," "Green Grass of Wyoming," and the Holy Bible, King James Version.

Applications for use of the machine should be made with Mrs. Bryant. Lending of the books and the machine will be made on a basis of need, it was explained.

### Contract Let To Tear Down Surplus Gym

Two contracts were let by members of the City Council at a meeting Monday night—one for the tearing down and stacking of materials in the surplus gymnasium at the Pampa Army Air Field, and the second for the hauling of the materials to McLean.

The materials will be used as far as possible in the construction of the municipal building—which will also serve as a gym—which voters approved in April. In the election in April, tax-paying voters okayed a \$50,000 bond issue, the money from which is to be used in erecting the municipal building.

The first of the two contracts was let to Lee Strickland of Pampa, who entered a bid of \$2,200 for tearing down the surplus gym and stacking the lumber and other materials. The second contract was let to L. N. Cunningham and Vaughn Smith of McLean. These men bid \$800 for hauling the materials from Pampa to McLean.

The surplus gym was bought about a year ago by the McLean school board. At first, the plan was to move the gym to McLean and set it up here, but it was found the cost for such plans was prohibitive. After the bond issue in April, a plan was worked out with the War Assets Administration whereby the materials could be used in the city building.

Work on dismantling the surplus gym will begin within two weeks, Mayor Harris King stated.

When work on the new building here will start was not announced. Blueprints and specifications must be made up, but before this can be done, the councilmen will have to do considerable planning on various details in the construction of the building. It is believed, however, that the building will be ready for use by the time the fall and winter indoor activities start.

J. B. Linn, the "Uncle Jay" of Radio Station KGNC, Amarillo, will be the guest speaker at the First Presbyterian Church in McLean Sunday morning at 11 o'clock.

A representative of the Uphaw and Adams Music company of Amarillo will be present to offer new and used instruments for sale and for rent. In addition, the representative will take old instruments for needed repair work.

The program outlined by Miller includes a concert each Saturday night at 7:30 o'clock in the City Park. This concert will be presented by a municipal band, consisting not only of high school and grade school students but all others who wish to join. A practice session for the municipal band will be held each Thursday night at 7:30 o'clock at the band house.

## Wanta Shoot An Elephant?

Some people really like to hunt. C. E. Cooke and Bert Huggins are two of them.

The pair of men will leave McLean July 19, undergo (if that is the word you would use) a 35-day hunt in the wilds of Africa, and fly around the world in the course of their travels. They will arrive back in Amarillo September 26.

The flight around the world is more or less incidental to the real nature of the trip—the 35-day hunting expedition in Africa. Cooke, who has hunted in Mexico on two occasions, in both the Alberta and British Columbia provinces of Canada, and in New Mexico, Texas, Arizona, Montana, and Wyoming, considers the African expedition a sort of climax.

The trip itself, however, will be something. Cooke and Huggins will leave Amarillo by TWA plane July 19 at 12:45 noon, fly to New York, then to Newfoundland, thence to Shannon, Ireland,

and on to Paris, France. They will have a two-day layover in Paris to see the sights.

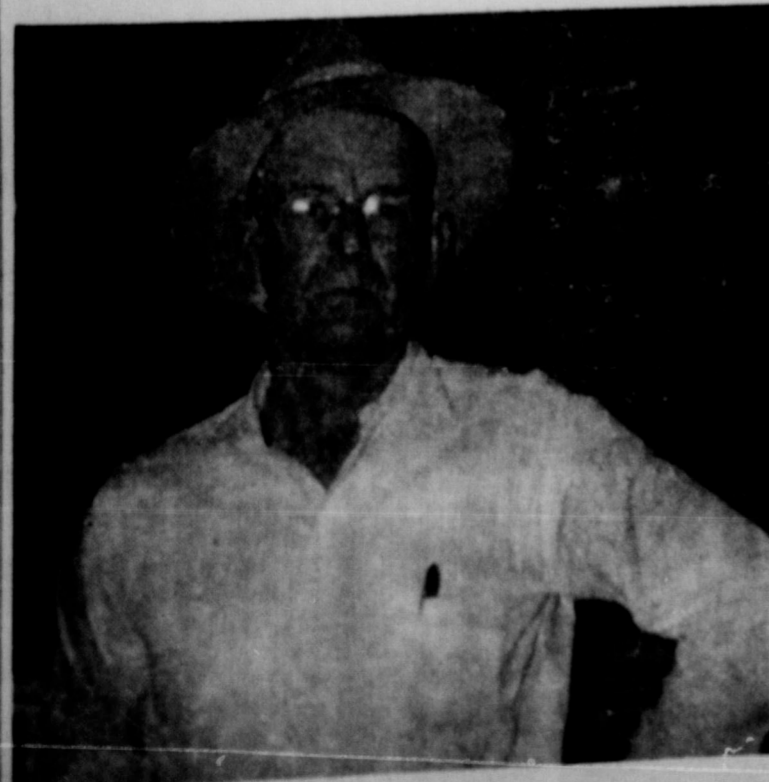
From Paris, the two men will go to Geneva, Switzerland, to Rome, Italy, to Athens, Greece, and then to Cairo, Egypt, for another two-day layover. From Cairo, they will fly to Nairobi, capital of British East Africa. They will be joined at Nairobi by Bill Franklin, young hunter from Amarillo, who has already left his city for the hunting points and who is making the trip across by ship.

The hunting expedition will start August 1. After the hunt is over, they will return to Cairo, picking up the main line of the TWA. Then off they will fly to Jerusalem, and to Dahanon, India. At this Indian point, the pair will hunt five days for the famous black tiger, since this species of animal can only be found there. Then they will fly on to Bombay and Calcutta, In-

dia, and then to Hongkong, China, for two days. From there they will go to Tokyo, Japan, for a two-day layover. The next stop will be Honolulu, Hawaii, for another two days. From there they will fly to Los Angeles, Calif., and back to Amarillo.

The African hunt will be something to write home about—if they have time to do any writing. Equipment for the hunt will be carried by jeep to a base camp. All hunting will be done on foot, Cooke says. One white guide and 20 Negroes are furnished for every two hunters.

What will they hunt? Just almost anything. To be allowed to hunt there, the men had to apply for a certain kind of license, and that license allows them to kill so many of certain species of animals, and the species include just about anything. The take can include elephants, lions, hippos, rhinoceros, giraffe, (Continued on back page)

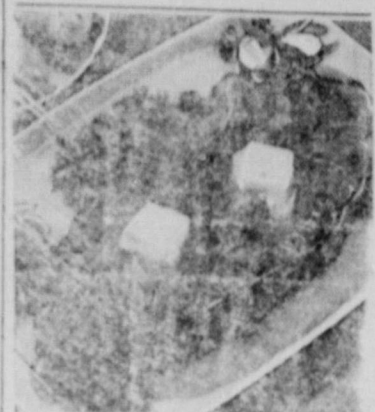

### T. B. OR NOT T. B.

ON AUGUST 24, 1948, the portable X-ray unit of the State Department of Health paid a visit to McLean. A total of 619 people took advantage of the tax-supported service, and had X-rays made to determine whether or not tuberculosis symptoms were present.

This year the X-ray unit will again be in McLean, under the sponsorship of the county medical and tuberculosis associations. The unit will be here two days instead of one. The dates are July 6 and 7.

There are a number of points to be stressed. The first is this: Because you had an X-ray made last year does not mean you should not have one made this year. Doctors will tell you it does not take a year to become infected with T. B. An annual X-ray will not prevent you from taking T. B., but it will warn you in time to do something about getting rid of the disease if you have.

The second point is this: You do not have to live in McLean, or even in Gray County, to take advantage of the free X-ray. If you live in Wheeler, Donley, or Collingsworth county, or anywhere else for that matter, you have just as much right to take the X-ray here as anyone else. This service is for the people in general, not for just a few.

The third point is this: Taking the X-ray will require only about two minutes of your time, from the moment you step in the door until you leave. You get a card filled out, step up to the machine, the picture is taken, and that's all. You do not even have to take off your shirt or any other wearing apparel—do not wear something with metal buttons, however.

The fourth point is this: The films will be developed and studied in Austin. You will be notified of the reaction, whether negative or positive. If positive, it's time for you to act.

The fifth point is this: You may not have T. B., probably haven't. But if you should have and do not find out about it, then you are not only endangering yourself, but also your family and your friends and others with whom you come in contact.

So take advantage of the free X-ray service when July 6 and 7 roll around.

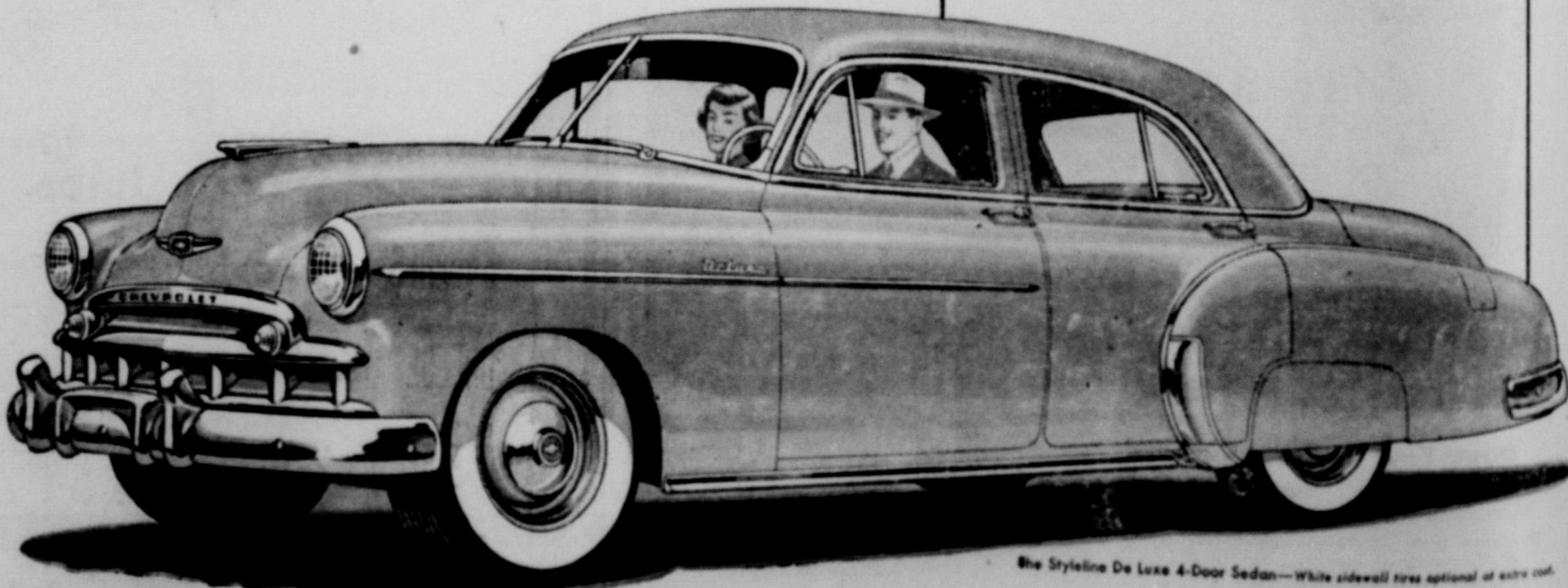

leopards, water buffalo, five kinds of antelope, and various other animals. The license specifications state that each hunter may kill only one elephant, so many lions, and to get the licenses requires a lot of trouble. Cooke and Huggins even had to have sworn statements from the sheriff that neither had been convicted of a felony for the past five years.

But the license wasn't all. For every country which they will fly into, the men had to have a visa. That's the permit which is necessary in addition to the regular American passport. And they also have to carry loads of identification in addition to the passports.

And that still isn't all. The men must have a World's Health certificate. To get that, they had to undergo shots for typhoid, typhus, tetanus, titus, smallpox, yellow fever, and cholera. When they arrive in Africa, they must take a shot to ward off the disease transmitted by some deadly fly, the name of which Cooke can't remember. But he and Huggins both know there were plenty of shots, and they've just about wound up that part of the preparation.

The correspondence necessary to make preparations for the flight around the world and the hunt almost necessitated hiring a special secretary. But considerable help was received from various places, Cooke stated, and the details have now been ironed out.

Cooke plans to take along his movie camera. He wants to take a wire recorder to record the sounds of the animals, providing he can find one which will work with battery power.

The preliminaries are about over. The hunt isn't far away. Want to go along and shoot an elephant?
