Legion Home Undergoing Overhauling

a new roof on the building, but that project has been delayed until a later date. The window screens will either

NOW YOU DO SOMETHING

SEVERAL WEEKS AGO The News brought to the attention of its readers the fact that there is a danger in the exposed sewage disposal plant at the former Prisoner of War Camp near McLean.

At that time it was pointed out that the enormous hole should be done away with, in whatever would be the best manner. The hole is enclosed by a wooden fence, but boards on the fence are loose and others could easily be torn down by children playing in the vicinity. The structure of the hole is such that should a person, even an adult, fall in, it would be impossible to get out without help. Water which has collected in the hole makes it an ideal place for some youngster to drown.

As far as we know, nothing has been done about the situation. The danger still exists. Some readers have also told us that there are other old well holes at the former camp, and all could be dangerous.

The News can do nothing about the holes. The only thing we can do is to bring these facts to your attention, make suggestions, and then leave it up to you. In other words, The News can serve as your voice, and that's about all in this case.

As for suggestions, we do have a few.

First, do not expect the city officials to have the holes filled in. The property lies far beyond the city limits. The city officials do not have the authority to have the dangers eliminated, although they can, and should, be of help in seeing that the work is done.

Second, the proper place to go, and to write, is to your county governing officials. This means your county commissioners and your county judge. We suggest you first contact Earnest Beck, local commisioner, and urge him to get something done. Then follow up with a letter to him, pointing out the danger, with copies to the county judge and the commissioners court. If enough would do this instead of talking to one another on the street corners, then action would be forthcoming.

So let's get together on this matter and see that action is taken -before we are sorry.





Place the crystals, or any other moth repellent, in the folds of the material and wrap in heavy paper, and store in a sealed container such as a box or plastic bag, Professos Saville continues.



Texans Escape Seige of Typhus

fortunate in escaping any serious outbreaks of typhus fever this year, the total number of reported cases so far being 133. This is a gratifying decrease in the incidence of this disease, but at the ame time, it is well to warn that nly continued stringent rodentcontrol measures will hold this fisease in check.

This is the advice of Dr. Geo W. Cox, state health officer, who says that "typhus is one of the most debilitating of all diseases. and the long drawn out illness results in such loss of time that this factor is usually even more expensive to the victim than his

doctor and hospital bills." Inasmuch as typhus fever is transmitted to man by the rat flea, the control of typhus depends almost entirely upon ridding ourseives of rats. No garbage should be left exposed where they can get to it to feed. Granaries and feed houses should be rat-proofed so that rats are starved out. All rat harborages such as trash piles, piles of old lumber, accessible quarters in the walls and foundations of buildings and other suitable living quarters should be denied them. Houses and business buildings can be effectively rat-proofed at a comparatively low cost, and the expense is always much less than the damage that can be done by rats, and he sickness they can spread.

"When the rat is gone, typhu ever will go also," Dr. Cox said Keep building out, starving out, and killing all rats, and typhus fever will no longer menace the health of our people."
