## Local Board Says Decision Made Too Late

The board of the McLean Independent School District has filed suit in the 313th District Court protesting the action of the Donley County school board in shifting the two dormant districts of Whitefish and Glenwood from

McLean to Alanreed. The suit was filed Monday in the office of District Clerk Dee Patterson by Attorneys James W Witherspoon and John D. Aikin of Hereford in behalf of the local

The action is being brought by the local district, and names as defendants the Alanreed Independent School District, the Donley County School Board, and the Gray County School Board. It was brought about by the action of the Donley board in shifting the two districts-Whitefish and Glenwood common school districts -from McLean to Alanreed after the legal deadline for annexation under the provisions of the new
