





Q. Last week we explained the difference between old-age assistance and old-age and survivor insurance. Today we have the question-what is the difference tetween old-age and survivorinsurance and unemployment compensation?

A. Old-age and survivors insurance is payable either to eligibl persons at age 65 or to survivor in case of death. Unemployment compensation is payable to eligibipersons at any age if they are unemployed through no fault o' their own and are "ready and available" for suitable work.

Q. Is everyone eligible for unemployment compensation?

A. No. Only workers who have worked for employers who pay unemployment compensation taxes. In Texas this is an employer who is engaged in work covered by Social Security and then only if he normally hires 8 or more people. This requirement varies in the separate states, and any employer can elect to be covered if he desires.

Q Doesn't the worker pay for unemployment compensation? A. No-not in Texas. A worker gains credit by working for a covered employer who pays the
