

- teaspoons light corn syrup

l teaspoon vanilla Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, water, and corn syrup in top of double boiler. Beat with

rotary egg beater or electric beater about 1 minute, or until thoroughly mixed. Cook over

rapidly boiling water beating constantly with rotary egg beater (or at high speed of electric mixer) 7 minutes, or until frosting will stand up in stiff peaks. (Stir frosting up from bottom and sides of pan occasionally with rubber scraper, spatula, or spoon. Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla and beat 1 minute, or until thick enough to spread Note: For a smoother frosting, wipe down sides of pan with a fork wrapped in a damp cloth before and during cooking and beating, to prevent crystallization.





WHEN YOU ARE DOING your Christmas shopping, regardless of whether you are shopping in a small town like McLean or a city the size of Chicago or New York, be careful where and how you walk.

The Texas Department of Public Safety claims that a concealing umbrella or an armful of Christmas packages unless it is done by error. rank high in the cause of the great pedestrian death rate at this time of year.

"Probably the commonest sight in the city at this time of year," Col. Homer Garrison Jr., head of the Texas department, says, "is the frantic Christmas shopper dashing running poetry, it's hard to stop. from curb to curb with packages stacked from the crook, You'd be surprised how many of her arm to the bridge of her nose. With her view cut off this way, is it really any wonder that more than 1,000 pedestrians were killed last December?" Col. Garrison also points out that an umbrella can cut off the pedestrian's view to quite an extent, as can falling or blowing snow and sleet.

There are a few simple rules to follow, and they may keep you from getting a broken neck.

1. Never assume, merely because you can see an approaching car, that the motorist can see you. 2. Cross only at intersections when the light is in your

3. Do not let the fact that you are obeying correct pedestrian practices lull you to the point of not remaining With Butterick and McCall.
