

A view like the one pictured above has now been in existence on most Texas highways for the past few months. This type of highway curve sign serves to warn of the maximum safe and comfortable speed for curves and turns.

These signs are part of a program of advisory speed zoning by the Texas Highway Department and represent a step recommended by the Governor's High vay Safety Conference.

Motorists who utilize the speed advised on these signs have found that there is no side-throw in their cars at this speed. The speed indicated on the sign was determined by a scientif-

ic study of each individual curve and turn, and will vary because of the different elements such as degree of turn and the amount of bank on each separate curve.


