

State's Affairs Badly Organized; TEC to Study

By JOHN BEN SHEPPERD Secretary Texas Economy Commission

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles on the background, purposes and work of the Texas Economy

Your Texas state government is ccurately summarized in those three words. In a nutshell, they speak of disorganization and widespread confusion.

The Texas Economy Commission has been appointed by Governor Allan Shivers as an advisory body to examine the state government and recommend a practical program for efficient reform. Let's take a look at what the

TEC will have to examine: There are nearly 200 separate agencies of the executive branch of the government. These are run by nearly 150 administrative groups or individuals.

The state conducts its financial affairs out of more than 230 sepa-rate checking accounts. Some have less than \$50 in them. Some have tens of millions of dollars in them. Many accounts are earmarked for special purposes and are not available as a general fund. A true general fund provides the logical, the practical, the economical means of carefully controlled government

Texas, unfortunately, has no such arrangement.

As further illustration of how sad is the state of affairs, consider all these nearly 200 agencies. Many of them are supervised by the appointees of as many as three different governors.

This simply means that if one of these agencies fails to do a good job, the voters are too far removed from control of the situation. They cannot correct things by voting out the current governor; he didn't appoint a majority of the supervisors of the offending agency. They cannot vote the supervisors out of office because the supervisors hold office by appointment only. The governor himself cannot do anything about the situation because he can only appoint a minority of the supervisors.

The result of all this division of is simply a mess.
