A line proposed constitutional amendments headed by a recommended boost in the welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$80 million and a \$3.5 billion water bond position, are ready for an August 5 ballot.

A survey of public opinion on proposals by the Governor's Committee on Public School Education, including the controversial consolidation recommendation, was made at the request of Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston, and the committee learned that big school districts liked its ideas, but small districts didn't.

Roy Sherrod, 79 Pioneer Resident Buried Tuesday

Roy Sherrod, Alaneed, died Hospital at 1:30 a.m. Sunday in McLean Hospital.

He was born Oct. 25, 1889, in Cleburn and was married to Lela Moreland in McLean June 26, 1918. He and his older brother, Wilmuth, left Norman, Okla., in 1909 and drove a herd of horses and covered wagons to the farm and ranch home near Alaneed where he was living at the time of his death.

He served 22 years on the Alaneed School Board and was a member of Alaneed Baptist Church.

Funeral services were held at First Baptist Church in McLean at 3 p.m. Tuesday. Rev. M. Smith, pastor of Alaneed Baptist church, officiated, assisted by Rev. Dan Beltz, pastor of First Baptist Church, McLean and L. P. Fort, lay minister from Pampa. Burial was in Hillcrest Cemetery by Lamb Funeral Home.

Survivors are his wife, of the home; two daughters, Mrs. Eulene Walker, Mobeetie; Mrs. Jeanne Brown, McLean; two sons, Bob Sherrod of McLean, and Joe Ed Sherrod, Dallas; seven grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Bert Smith, Lakewood, Calif.; Mrs. J. C. Todd, Norman, Okla.; and Mrs. C. E. Greenwood, Wichita Falls.

Mr. and Mrs. Hinton are members of the United Methodist Church of McLean; and have been members of the Wesley Sunday School Class for many years. She is a member of the Women's Society of Christian Service. He has served as a steward of the church.

REPORT WHEAT ACRES

The final date to dispose of any excess wheat and to report the final acre to this office is May 15. Producers are encouraged to come in and report the wheat acres just as soon as you have decided how much you intend to harvest.

Each producer should measure his own acreage and bring the figures into us. Or you can request measurement service and have a representative of this office come out and measure the wheat for you. Final date to request wheat measurements service is May 1—and the cost is \$7.00 per farm plus \$2.00 for each additional plot.

Diverted acres must not be grazed after April 30—and cannot be grazed from that date until October 1. Failure to have the necessary number of diverted acres would lose farm payment.

School Golf Team Going To State

The sun was bright and warm. A soft breeze rustles the flags on the greens of Meadowbrook Golf Course. In the distance the familiar Click of clubhead striking ball was the dominant sound. It was a perfect day for golf.

According to the U. S. Weather Bureau's State Climatologist, 140 confirmed tornadoes occurred in Texas last year. This compares with a record 232 reported during 1967.

Knowing what to do when a tornado approaches may mean the difference between life and death for you and your family. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar. If you are in open country move at right angles to the tornado's path.

If you are in a city or town seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!

People in houses, without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.

In schools, stay inside, away from windows remain near an inside wall on the lower floor when possible. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly supported roofs!

In the McLean Elementary grades each room is assigned to a certain home owner's cellar and the children should be orderly and follow their teachers instructions.

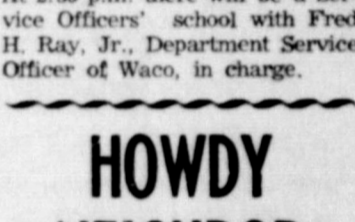

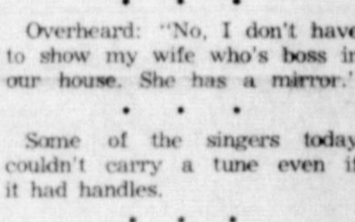

FHA Making Loans For Relocating

The Farmers Home Administration can now make loans to farm and ranch owners or tenants for outdoor income producing recreational enterprises according to Claude Moore, County Supervisor.

Loans to individuals can be made to convert all or a portion of their farms to recreational facilities. The recreational enterprise may supplement regular farm income or, in some cases, replace farm income by converting the entire farm to recreation.

Public recreational areas are increasing in number each year; however, the demand for such facilities still exceeds what is available. The purpose of this loan program is two-fold in that it will provide more recreational areas and help farmer and ranchers to increase their income, stated Mr. Moore.

Loans may be made for camping, picnicking, and hiking facilities, swimming, boating, skiing and fishing facilities, golf courses riding stables or many other forms of outdoor recreation. Funds can be used to purchase necessary materials, supplies and animals, acquire and develop land and water resources, construct or improve modest essential buildings, and to purchase and install needed equipment and fixtures.

Each loan will be scheduled for repayment over a period not to exceed 40 years at five per cent interest. Interested individuals should contact Claude Moore at the City Hall in McLean from 10:00 to 12:00 on the fourth Wednesday of each month, or at Box 40, Clarendon, Texas 79226.

COTTON FARMERS TO VOTE ON ALLOTMENT TRANSFER

Growers of cotton in all up-
 land cotton producing counties
 will vote during the period May
 5 through May 9 on whether to
 permit the transfer of 1970 cot-
 ton acreage allotments to farms
 in other counties by sale or
 lease.
 If in any county at least two-
 thirds of the growers voting fav-
 or the transfer, growers of that
 county will be permitted to trans-
 fer their allotments by sale or
 lease to farmers in other counties
 within the same state. Any lease
 agreement filed with the county
 ASC committee between June 1
 and Dec. 31, 1969, where an allot-
 ment is transferred within or
 outside a county, will, if approv-
 ed, be honored by the committee
 for the number of years specified
 in the lease. Allotment may not
 be shifted to other states.
 Where approved by at least
 two thirds of the growers vot-
 ing in the county, transfer of al-
 lotments to other counties will be
 permitted during 1970. The trans-
 fer of allotments is authorized
 in the Food and Agriculture Act
 of 1965. This Act, as amended,
 and the authority to transfer al-
 lotments expires at the end of
 1970.
 The May 5-9 referendum on
 this question will be the fourth
 to be considered and conducted
 by mail. Ballots will be delivered
 to all cotton growers of record
 in counties holding a referendum
 next month. Officials have said
 that a mail vote has proved to be
 more convenient for growers,
 rather than having to appear in
 person at their polling place, par-
 ticularly during a busy season.
 To be counted, all votes should be

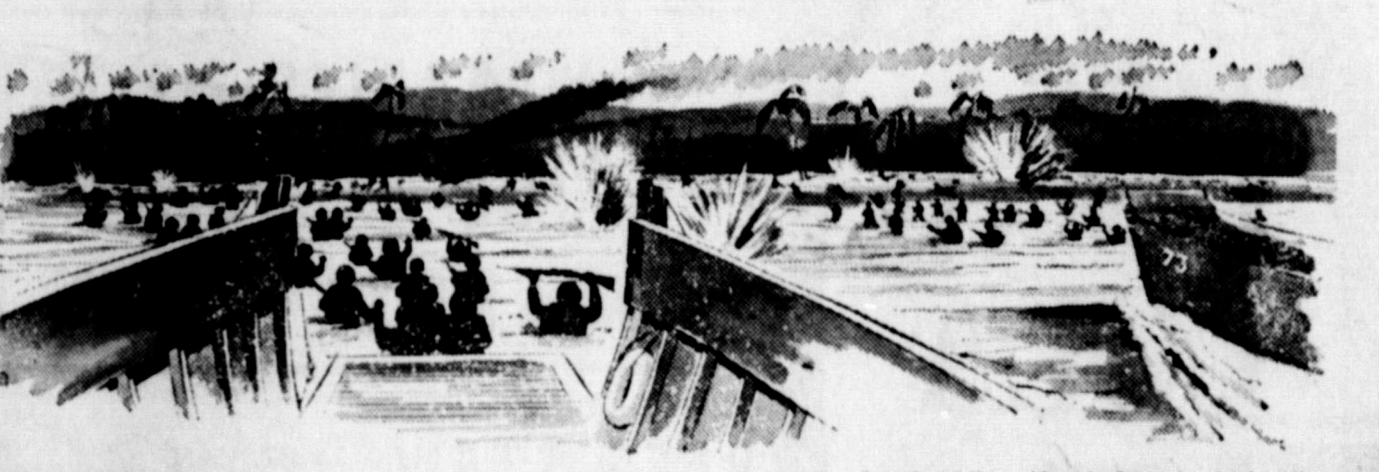

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LOOKIN' BACK

Two of our old-time cowboys have attended their last round-up. Jesse Kemp and Roy Sherrod, long-time residents of the McLean-Alanreed area answered roll call at the corral in the skies this week. Good-bye, old-timers. You will be missed, but your memory will linger long in the hearts of your many friends.

George Turner, a member of the Back School in 1912 when I first began my feeble efforts to instruct the young, made the front page of the Amarillo Daily News Monday morning. Sorry, George, that you didn't mention McLean in your story, for we are proud to claim you as our old-timer. George and Jaudon Cobb, also known to many of our readers, had many interesting experiences in the sand hills of the old Northfork-Back Community, and each one mentioned the other when he wrote his respective family history.

Jaudon recalls the time when he and George were walking home from school and George suggested that they set a grass fire and watch it burn—just a little. The flames got out of control when a whirlwind raced through it and the boys fought desperately to put it out. In desperation, George suggested his pal take his pants off and use them to fight the fire (He had heard of cowboys who did this). Jaudon said, "No questions were asked and, in perfect obedience, I did what George asked. However, Mother asked a number of questions when I got home!"

George Turner has barbered in Amarillo since 1923: first at 710 Polk, then he moved to 113 W. Seventh. When he left this location in 1961 to move to 217 W. Seventh, Wes Izzard said in his "A to Izzard" column:

"Nothing can interfere with the orderly going and coming of men as the moving of a long-established barbershop. Men are much more creatures of barbershop habit than are women when it comes to beauty-parloring."

"That's why so many men are wandering about the streets in a daze, looking for George Turner."

"Mr. Turner operated the Star Barbershop on Seventh, between Polk and Tyler, for over 30 years. Suddenly, high finance decreed that he vacate the premises. The other day he moved down in the next block beyond the bus station. It was like moving a landmark."

In one of my recent visits with George at his barbershop, we talked of old times. He recalled when he and his father, E. T. Turner, carried their last load of cotton to Uncle Johnny Long's gin in Mobeetie. On the way home, they were caught in the first snow storm of the season and, being unable to make it any farther, drove up to Uncle Lewis Webb's home and asked to spend the night. Both the Webbs made them welcome in true western hospitality style.

This coming Sunday is the time of meeting of the Alanreed-McLean Historical Society. We are having a good program. Rose Hall will bring a story from Alanreed, and Clara Reneau will give her family history. If you think Clara doesn't have something to tell, you are mistaken. I have read her paper and find it most unusual. She brings in some customs and early-day experiences that have not been brought out before. You'll miss something if you don't hear it.

Annie Reeves has a surprise for those coming Sunday. If you know Annie, you will agree that what she does is never done by halves, so be there and enjoy an hour and half of history and reminiscing. There's going to be pictures that will stir your memory.

TEXAS POLITICS

I'm writing this at the end of the week and it seems like Monday was about two weeks ago. We took up the House Appropriations bill and it wasn't really too bad a bill. However, there were a number of items in there that I didn't like and we tried to make some changes without success.

It's smaller than the Senate bill so now a Conference Committee of five members from each house will work out the differences. It will be real interesting to see just what comes out. I remember last session that they came up with about 30 million dollars more money and a bunch of things that were not in either of the bills.

We had a rough day Wednesday which included a five-hour Revenue and Taxation Committee hearing on the proposed chemical tax. We had something like 34 people appear from all types of industry including a number of farmers. I think that this bill won't get anywhere either.

That's the funny thing—not really funny—that very few of the tax bills we have heard so far have much chance of passing as presented. But the fact still remains that we are going to come up with a bunch. Maybe next week I can have a little more to say about taxes and the teachers pay raise.

Now, let's talk about the amendment to allow Liquor-by-the-Drink on a local option basis.

You may remember that I have given you quite a bit of information about this proposal and it has been a real difficult decision with lots of pressure. They needed 100 votes on final reading to pass it. Wednesday they got 95 votes and then with a lot of work they wound up with 101 votes Thursday.

I voted "No" both times. Here is how our District voted in the referendum last year:

Hansford County, For 319, Against 756; Ochiltree County For 364, Against 849; Lipscomb County For 179, Against 489; Roberts County For 158, Against 212; Hemphill County, For 313, Against 518; Gray County For 2,207, Against 2,913; Wheeler For 503, Against 1,365. Total for were 4,043 and 7,096 against.

The amendment will be voted on in November 1970. If it passes, which it probably will do, the Legislative will enact the regulations and then it will be legal only in those Counties that vote to have it. So, it will be about two years before it might become effective.

During the last part of May, 40,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acres questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. You are encouraged to complete the Texas Crop and livestock report questionnaire and return it to SRS.

The information requested on this questionnaire will be the basis for the official estimates of crop acreage for the State of Texas for each county. Reports are needed from many farmers so the county will be well represented. Accurate reports are necessary and very important to the farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas Agriculture.
