

DECEMBER 7, 1941-Certainly not a day for celebration, certainly not a day for hilarity and joy, but certainly a day which we should all remember, and remember well.

It was just nine years ago that the cruel, uncalled for, sneak attack of the Japanese on Pearl Harbor came . just nine years ago when the mass murder was committed . . just nine years ago when men were not given a chance to defend themselves, when men were shot down without warning, without even knowing that a war was suddenly being started.

That day cost many lives . . . and the days and years following December 7, 1941, cost many, many more lives. All because we human beings are unable to live together in a peaceful manner . . . all because some of us have a lust for power . . . all because some of us have no consideration for the rights of others, for the lives of

Now we come to the 9th anniversary of this attack which immediately threw our nation into direct conflct. Even before the attack came, the war which we now well remember as World War II was on its way. But that one attack brought it on in a matter of minutes.


