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Harvesting of the cotton and grain crop in the McLean area is about over. So far the two gins in McLean, the Paymaster Gin and the McLean Gin, have handled a total of 662 bales, and the entire crop is not expected exceed 800 bales. That's quite drop from the 4,000 ginned here season. The two ginners, L. Earthman and S. R. Jones, fairly well agree on the amount yes to be brought in. If fair weather prevails through Saturday, approximately 90 per cent of cotton will be in by that tims.

The grain crop has been some what better, but harvesting of the grain is practically over. Jones buying grain again this season. and has shipped out 24 rail carloads and one truck load. He stated that he is still buying small amounts every day or so, but that almost all the grain has been h.rvested.

CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

For example, who started this idea of decorating a Christmas tree? Martin Luther, the German reformation leader, is generally credited with lighting the first Christmas tree. The story is told that Luther was walking through the countryside one Christmas Eve under a brilliant starlit sky and his thoughts turned to the Nativity of the Christ Child. He was awed by the beauty of the heavens and the winter landscape. He rushed home and told his family of the beauty he had witnessed, and in attempting to describe more fully what he had seen, Luther attached some lighted candles to a small evergreen tree to portray the light of the starry heavens.

Candy and nuts in the Christmas stocking: This habit of hanging a stocking on the fireplace stems from an old legend wherein the jolly old gentleman was driving his team of reindeer across the winter sky dropping gold coins down chimneys. In one case, the coins fell down the chimney and bounced into a stocking that had been left on the hearth to dry. 

The first printed cards were put out by Joseph Cundall, a London artist, who sold about 1,000 of these cards in the year 1846. The custom really began to grow about 1862.

"Yule" season: The Yule log was originated by ancient Druid priests who blessed a log with a colorful cermony and proclaimed that it should be kept ever burning. The ceremony originated during the period when the sun started northward again after its winter solstice. At this time the ancient Teuonie and Celtic races held a festival celebrating the turning of the wheel of time. This mythical wheel was called the "Houl" or the "Hioul." Thus the name "Yule" came to be applied to the Christmas season in most northern countries,

"Silent Night, Holy Night": Words to this song were written by Father Josef Mohr in Austria, and the music by Franz Gruber. Father Mohr needed something extra special for the midnight mass preceding Christmas. The night before Christmas, he had to administer rites for a dying woman, and it was late in the evening when he returned to the little village. As he viewed the outline of the village from a hill, he imagined the scenery must have been similar that night in Bethlehem. Deeply moved, he went home and wrote the words to the Christmas carol, and the next morning he took the words to his organist, Franz Gruber, who caught the spirit of the carol.

Santa Claus as the jolly, round-bellied little fellow as we picture him: Three men actually contributed to his present-day appearance. In 1809, Washington Irving described him as a jolly mannered, chubby little fellow who traveled by air in a sleigh. A cartoonist, Thomas Nast, created the first visual image of Santa Claus with his white beard and red, ermine-trimmed coat. In 1822, Prof. Clement C. Moore evidently added the finishing touches to Santa Claus in his poem, "The Visit of St. Nicholas."



Old style, palate tickling, sucriety.

Increased danger of spoilage eaten. comes with the change, State says.

Used to be you could salt down a ham, then home-smoke it slow and easy. When done, you could hang it on the back porch easily accessible for a quick slice.

Those days are fast waning for city bound folks. Ask your butcher for a smoked ham nowadays, and you get two choices: "tenderized" or "ready-to-eat." They look the same, and have some of the old sweetness. But there the similarity ends, Dr. Cox says.

Since less preservative salt is used in the smoking process, today's ham products have to be placed under immediate refrigeration, the same as any other meat.

"Tenderized" hams are smoked at a temperature of approximately 129 degrees. Dr. Cox says that means they have to be cooked before eating in order to kill any triching larvae that may be present.

"Trichina larvae, which cause trichinosis, are killed at a tempinternal temperature."
