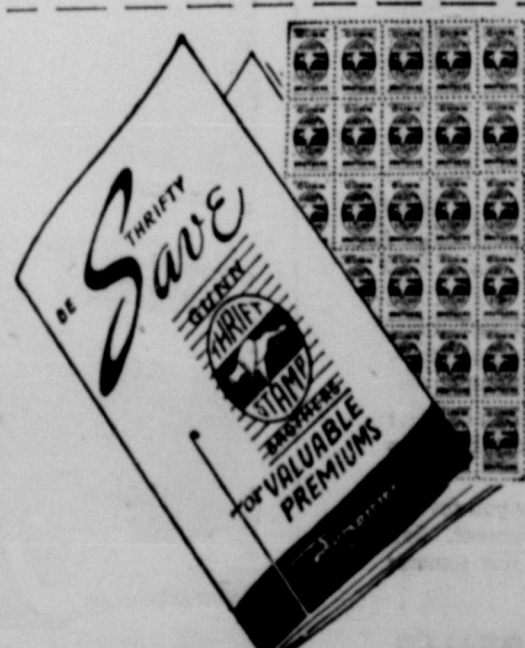

## MEDICINE

THE PRESS AND RADIO of the United States recently featured the amazing case of a Negro woman who was found frozen in a Chicago alley in a condition which bordered on rigor mortis. Her body temperature, pulse, and respiration were all so low that it seemed impossible that she could survive—no one in a similar condition ever had. However, skilled and unremitting work by doctors, nurses, and hospital attendants resulted in a miracle—the woman lived.

An unusual comment on the matter appeared shortly thereafter in the Arkansas State College newspaper, which said, "To us in the United States, this case appeals mainly as another wonderful accomplishment of modern medicine, but in countries with socialized medicine, the citizens are struck dumb at another miracle. This miracle is the time consumed by the hospital staff on one patient."

"In socialized medicine countries, doctors and nurses are plagued with insignificant cut and bruise cases and innumerable neurotics who must be cared for under penalty of the law. Each patient is allotted a certain amount of time. Hospital staffs cease to take a personal interest in their patients and haven't the time to care for the patients as individuals."

"Although the medical profession in this country is accused of being mercenary, and some arguments can be given to support these accusations, socialized medicine is not the cure."

In other words, medicine is one place where the mass production idea does not fit. We must never destroy that fine relationship between doctor and patient which has been built up so painstakingly under our system of free medicine.

The present administration is still plugging, at every opportunity, its plan of compulsory health insurance, which would undoubtedly be the first step toward complete socialization of medicine.

The administration seems to have the idea that the

government is obligated to see that its citizens are cared for from the time of birth until the time of death. Under the trend our government is taking—at least some of the government leaders want this trend to continue—no one would have any responsibilities any more.

We are wondering this: If the government is going to care for us from the time we are born until the time we die, who is going to care for the government?

From the first grade on up, the performances by the students, and the few adults who participated, were simply wonderful. All were most impressive.

And the scenery which formed the beautiful background would have been hard to better. It demonstrated what hard work and good planning can do. To attempt to describe the scenery is too much for me. If you weren't among the 1,500 who crowded into the building, you just should have been.

It was truly a wonderful pageant.

It is hoped by many, including me, that the pageant—an idea which originated in the mind of Guy Beasley months ago when he was still living in the city limits and was still a member of the

City Council—should become an annual affair. A thing like that pageant can know no bounds in its growth, and in its everlasting effect on the minds of people.

In other words, it can be expanded into a huge community affair, wherein many of us can help with the decorations and the work, and those with talent can take part in the pageant.

It was good and wholesome, and above all, it certainly made me and about 1,500 other people there realize what Easter means.

Among the cast members, in the event you were not present at the pageant, was McLean's most talented vocalist. None other than Bill Day. Bill has one of the most beautiful singing voices I have ever heard, and McLean is fortunate in having that young man around to participate in such events as the pageant.

There's just no two ways about it—Bill Day has a very, very good voice.

To change the subject slightly, and rather drastically, I would like to mention that many people are getting drowsy nowadays, as far as the world situation is concerned. In other words, many feel that the danger we faced when the Chinese Communist troops first invaded the Korean war is over. But it isn't. As a matter of fact, it wouldn't be over, even if the North Koreans and Chinese Communists surrendered completely. The danger still lurks, and will continue to lurk so long as the Russian menace exists.

In the meantime, however, President Truman dons a flowered shirt and prances around among his bodyguards somewhere down in Florida for a vacation. Perhaps he is tired. Perhaps he does need a vacation. But he definitely needs to "keep on his toes," so to speak, and not allow us, the common herd of Americans, to believe that the Russian menace is thing of the past. The Presi-

dent, you will find, draws pay which amounts to \$300 per day, or more, for the work he is supposed to do. That work includes looking after those things which might endanger the people who hired him for that job. But he takes the plane which his employers have bought for him and takes a trip to Florida for a vacation. If you were drawing \$300 for a job with the responsibilities which that of the President carries, would you feel morally obligated to fulfill the duties of the job? Or would you take a

vacation, too?  
The Russian menace is not over. Just read in a daily paper where the Russians have "refused to consider" the return of 670 lend-lease ships to the U. S.—ships that are the property of the U. S.

Guess Joe plans to do a lot of fishing himself with that many boats, eh, Harry?

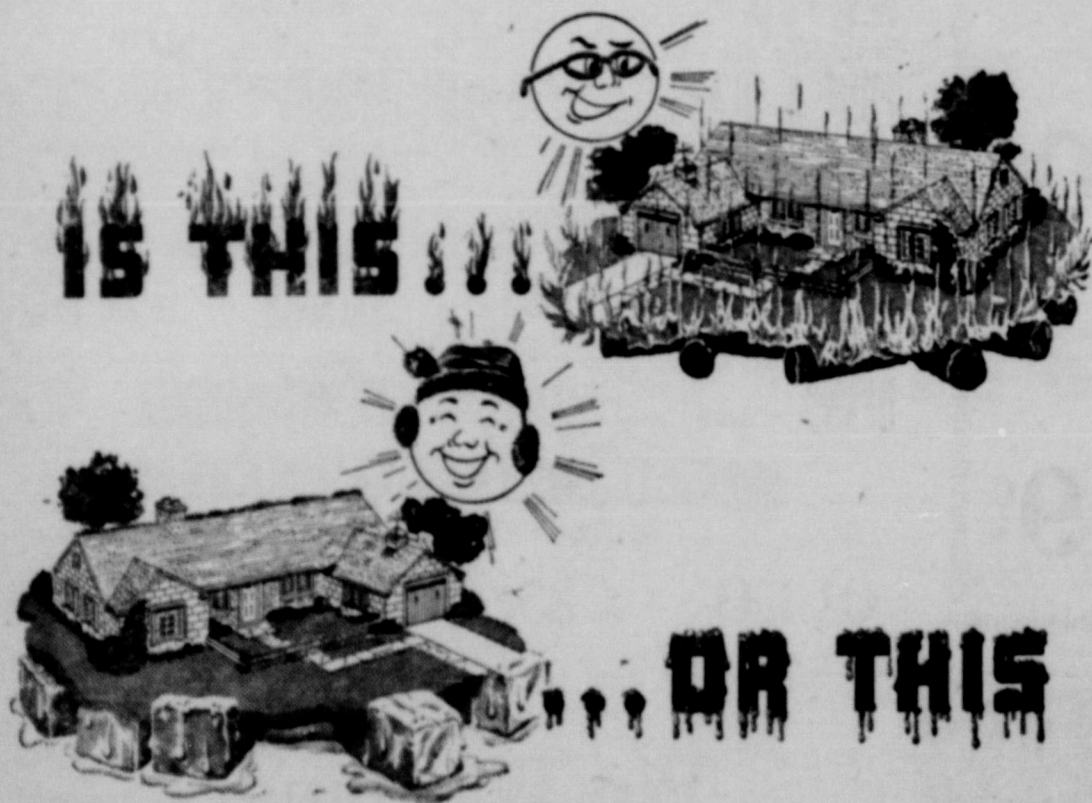
