Doctor Explains Three Major Kinds Of Heart Diseases

What do you know about your heart? Do you know that the three major kinds of heart disease are: rheumatic heart disease, high blood pressure, and coronary heart disease?

One of childhood's most dangerous foes is rheumatic fever, declares Dr. Geo, W. Cox, state health officer. A child is most likely to develop rheumatic fever when he is less than 10 years of age. However, the disease is not confined to children. In World War II about 40,000 men in the American forces developed attacks of rheumatic fever. This disease may damage the heart valves and muscle. Any child who has rheumatic fever should have the best of medical care, plenty of rest, a special diet, and be free from anxiety or worry. Just because a person has rheumatic fever, is no sign he will have rheumatic heart trouble. But it's important to keep in close touch with the family physician.

Coronary heart disease strikes those from middle age groups and up more than other forms of heart trouble. And, it strikes men more often than women. Moderation in daily living is very important, for if a person worries too much, works too hard, exer-

High blood pressure is another important cause of death. Naturally, the heart has to work harder to pump the blood, when blood pressure is high. An overworked heart needs the care of

Sometimes symptoms of heart trouble aren't so noticeable: that is why a regular physical examination is so important.

A lot of research has gone into the proper methods of washing dishes, especially during the past year when so much interest has centered around the home automatic dishwasher. It has been found, for example, that the most carefully hand-washed dishes, rinsed with scalding water, have a bacterial count two and one-half times greater than machine-washed dishes. Why is this so? Well, first, because

mechanical washers that really do a good job use water at temperature hotter than the hands can stand thus removing all particles of food soil and effectively destroying harmful bacteria. And second, because strong cleaning compounds can be used without danger to the

While the automatic dishwasher does not sterilize dishes in the true sense of the word, it does produce hygienically clean, sanitary dishes. This fact has been recognized by public health authorities who credit the discussion of the state of th the dishwasher with bringing a de cided advance in home sanitation If you are considering a dishwash er purchase, it is wise to select one that assures a supply of water at high temperature. And, of course, you'll want one that will do the job quickly in order to save you kitch en hours.

A Lamb Of A Cake!



You'll be the talk of the small-fry set if your next children's party includes this snowy little coconut lamb cake. And don't think the grownups won't love it, too! Housewares departments in any store carry the lamb mold. Then, with two packages of instant white cake mix and plenty of tender, shredded coconut, a lamb cake is no trick at all.

How to Do It

Turn 1 package white cake mix into bowl. Add 2 egg yolks and ½ cup milk. Blend, then beat 2 minutes. Add % cup milk. Blend, then beat 1 minute longer. (Beat cake vigorously by hand or at a low speed of electric minute of electric mixer.)

Pour batter into face half of well-greased lamb mold. Be sure some batter is placed in each ear. (Top left) Cover with back of mold and wire mold together. (Lower left) Place mold face-down on baking sheet and bake in hot oven (450° F.) 15 minutes.

Meanwhile prepare second package of white cake mix as directed on ackage. Turn batter into 13x9x2-inch pan, which has been lined on bottom with paper.

After lamb cake has baked 15 minutes in hot oven, reduce heat to 350° F., place second cake in oven, and bake both cakes 35 minutes longer.

Remove cakes from oven and open mold, removing back of mold first. Allow lamb to cool in face of mold about 5 minutes. Loosen cake from sides of mold and remove carefully. (Top right) Stand lamb cake on cake rack until cool. Cool other cake in pan on cake rack for 5 minutes, then loosen from sides with spatula, turn out, remove paper, and turn right-side up on rack to cool

Frost oblong cake with Seven Minute Frosting. Tint 1/2 cup coch a delicate green and sprinkle on top to represent grass. Then frost lamb cake with remaining Seven Minute Frosting and cover with untinted coconut. Use raisins for eyes and nose and a slice of maraschino cherry for mouth. Place lamb on center of cake base, as pictured above.
