Girls Win Region 1-A Basketball Title

Tigerettes to Play First Game In State Meet at Austin Friday

There were some who just couldn't believe that the McLean Tigerettes had a chance to whip the Dalhart girls on the basketball court. But the Tigerettes had other ideas, or else didn't hear those unfavorable comments. For the score at the end of the final game of the Region 1-A girls basketball tournament, held last week-end in the Municipal Building in McLean, was 51-42, and McLean had the 51 over Dalhart's 42.

Four Are Filed As Candidates School Board

Four names have been filed for the seven places on the McLean Independent School District board for the school election to be held Saturday, April 7.

The four filed are Clyde Andrews, Ercy Cubine, W. G. Carter, and Milton Carpenter. Boyd Reeves, president of the board, and Custer Lowary, the other two members of the present board, have announced that they will not seek re-election. Roy Kiser was the 7th member of the board, but resigned when he moved to Amarillo recently.

The entire board of seven persons is to be chosen this year, since the Gilmer-Aikin school law makes such provision in case of consolidation of two districts. Deadline for filing will be Wednesday, March 28, Charles Cousins, business manager, stated.

The victory gives the Tigerettes the right to represent Region 1-A in the state Class A tournament for girls at Austin this week-end. The tourney is to be held today, Friday, and Saturday. The girls were to leave McLean by private automobiles, riding with several fans who plan to attend the tournament.

The McLean girls will meet the girls from Carrizo Springs Friday afternoon at 1:45 o'clock in their first game in the state Class A tournament in Austin. Drawing for places in the play-off was held Monday. The Panhandle's Class B champion, Claude, will play Sulphur Bluff at 8:45 o'clock Friday morning. Finals in both Class A and Class B will be held Saturday night.

The girls, in winning the regional title, drew a bye in the opening rounds Thursday night. Friday night, the Tigerettes met the girls from Lockney, downing them 36-25 in an exciting game. Dorothy Gudel was high point for McLean with 21 points. Lockney had downed Shamrock 40-27 in one of the Thursday night games. The victory over Lockney Friday night placed the Tigerettes in the finals with Dalhart.

Dalhart, also drawing a bye in the opening round, defeated Canyon Friday night 47-34. Canyon had ousted Spur the night before 37-19.

In the play-off for third place in the first game Saturday night, Canyon downed Lockney 42-29. In the championship game Saturday night, McLean took an early lead with Bonita Bailey and Sue Lively sinking long shots as two guards were placed on Dorothy Gudel. The Tigerettes soon led 5-1, and Coach Maurice Norman of Dalhart ceased the two-guard-on-Gudel business, and Gudel really began to rack them up, making a total of 41 points during the game. The Tigerettes led 11-9 at the end of the first quarter; 25-16 at the half; 42-32 at the end of the 3rd period; and 51-42 at the close of the game.

Gudel of McLean and Tysene Cox of Canyon tied for high point honors for the tournament, with 62 each. Gudel played in only two games, however, while Cox played in three.

Dawson Named Local Director Of '66' Group

J. E. Dawson, owner of the new Trail-Inn Motel Courts in McLean, was named as the McLean director of the Texas unit of the Highway 66 Association at the annual meeting held in Amarillo last Friday afternoon.

Raising money to finance the advertising program for the coming year was the principal subject of discussion at the meeting. McLean's quota will be \$300, and Dawson plans to start work on the collecting of membership in the near future. The Texas unit plans to erect several large type signs to keep Oklahoma and New Mexico traffic on Highway 66. This will be done in addition to the advertising program of the national association.

Cecil Killough, owner of the Sage Brush Inn in Amarillo, was president from vice president to president of the association. A. J. Montgomery of Shamrock was chosen as vice president, and Mrs. Linton Wilson of Amarillo was named as secretary-treasurer. John L. McCarty of Amarillo, retiring president, presided at the session.

Nine Announce for City Offices

When the final deadline for filing for the city offices came at midnight Saturday, one man had filed for mayor, two for city secretary, one for city marshal, and five for the two vacant alderman spots.

Lone candidate for mayor will be E. J. Lander, who had filed the week before for that office. Lander, who is now a member of the city council, had turned in his resignation, effective after the April 3 city election, when he filed for the mayor's position.

Candidates for the city secretary's post will be D. A. Davis, present holder of the office, and George Colebank.

Seeking the two vacant places on the city council will be C. P. Callahan, Ruel Smith, Hickman Brown, Lester H. Campbell, and J. Lester Dyasart. The men filed in the order listed.

J. A. Sparks seeks re-election as city marshal, with no opposition. At the present time, the city council has only three members, Lander, J. C. Claborn, and Paris Hess. The other two aldermen, elected two years ago, have both moved from within the city limits. They were Guy Beasley, who moved to his farm several months ago, and W. L. Copeland, who moved to Farmington, N. M. A special election would have been required to fill the two vacancies, and the city council decided not to go to that expense.

However, another vacancy will occur following the April 3 election, since Lander will be leaving a vacancy on the council.

Linda Foster Killed in Crash At Ballinger

Funeral services for Linda Beatrice Foster, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Foster Jr. of Ballinger, former residents of the Liberty community, were held Sunday afternoon at the First Methodist Church in McLean.

Rites were conducted by Rev. W. B. Hicks, Methodist pastor. Interment was in Hillcrest cemetery under the direction of the Claborn Funeral Home.

Linda was the victim of a scooter accident near her home in Ballinger Thursday night of last week. Also killed in the same accident was Richard Gene Rollwitz, 10 years of age, of Ballinger.

The two youngsters were riding a scooter near the Foster home in Ballinger, when it collided with an automobile driven by Frank Quinroy Haines, 20. Linda's father was the first to reach the scene.

Foster stated that Richard came to his house on his scooter to take Linda for a ride. He gave his permission after they promised to stay off Highway 277. Haines was driving toward the highway on a dirt road leading from the residential section. He told highway patrolmen that he met a car and was partially blinded by the lights. When the car passed, he said he caught a dim view of a single light coming toward him on his side of the road. He said he whipped his car to the left, and as a result turned his car over. The scooter, carrying the two children, hit his car broadly. Richard was killed instantly, and Linda died a short time later.

Linda is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Foster Jr.; one brother, Butch; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Foster of McLean, and Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Summers of Salinas, Calif.; great-grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Summers of Elk City, Okla., and Mrs. Foster of Borger.

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ORDINANCE NO. 88
An ordinance amending "An ordinance granting to the Southwestern Public Service Company, their successors and assigns, a franchise, license, right of way, and privilege to erect, construct, equip, conduct, maintain and operate in the City of McLean, Texas, works or systems and plants to manufacture, use, store, sell, distribute, convey or otherwise establish, conduct, serve, supply and furnish said City, its inhabitants and others with electric light, heat and power, and to use the streets, alleys, highways, bridges and other public grounds of said City," being ordinance No. 88, establishing a new Residential and Commercial lighting service rate for power furnished within the City Limits of the City of McLean, and not otherwise, and that ordinance No. 32, passed and approved on the 24th day of February, 1927, shall in all other respects remain in full force and effect and shall not be in any other respect amended or changed hereby except as to this amendment, amended Ordinance No. 78, and Section 3 of said ordinance No. 32, passed and approved on the 24th day of February, 1927.

SECTION 1. It is agreed that the Residential service rate to be charged in the City of McLean, Texas, shall be that set forth in the following schedule:
MCLEAN, TEXAS
APPLICABLE: to residential customers for lighting and incidental purposes, including the operation of electric refrigerators or ranges where used in private residences, individual family apartments and in private garages. Motors not to exceed 5 hp, individual capacity, may be served under this rate.
RATE:
First 60 kwh used per month @ 6.60c per kwh.
Next 50 kwh used per month @ 4.95c per kwh.
Additional kwh used per month @ 2.20c per kwh.

SECTION 2. It is further agreed that the commercial lighting service rate to be charged in the City of McLean, Texas, shall be that set forth in the following schedule:
MCLEAN, TEXAS
APPLICABLE: To commercial and non-residential customers for lighting and single phase power, including motors of 5 hp, or less, individual capacity, and or heating units of 3 kw or less, individual capacity, where all service is taken through one meter. Centrally metered apartment houses shall be served hereunder.
RATE:
First 60 kwh used per month @ 6.60c per kwh.
Next 50 kwh used per month @ 5.78c per kwh.
Next 150 kwh used per month @ 4.13c per kwh.
Next 750 kwh used per month @ 3.85c per kwh.
Additional kwh used per month @ 1.53c per kwh.
MINIMUM: \$1.50 per month.
SECTION 3. Except as specifically provided in this ordinance, Ordinance No. 32, passed and approved by the City of McLean on the 24th day of February, 1927, shall in all other respects remain in full force and effect and shall not be in any other respect amended or changed hereby except as to this amendment, amended Ordinance No. 78, and Section 3 of said ordinance No. 32, passed and approved on the 24th day of February, 1927.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall be published as required by Article 1152 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Texas, 1925 Edition.

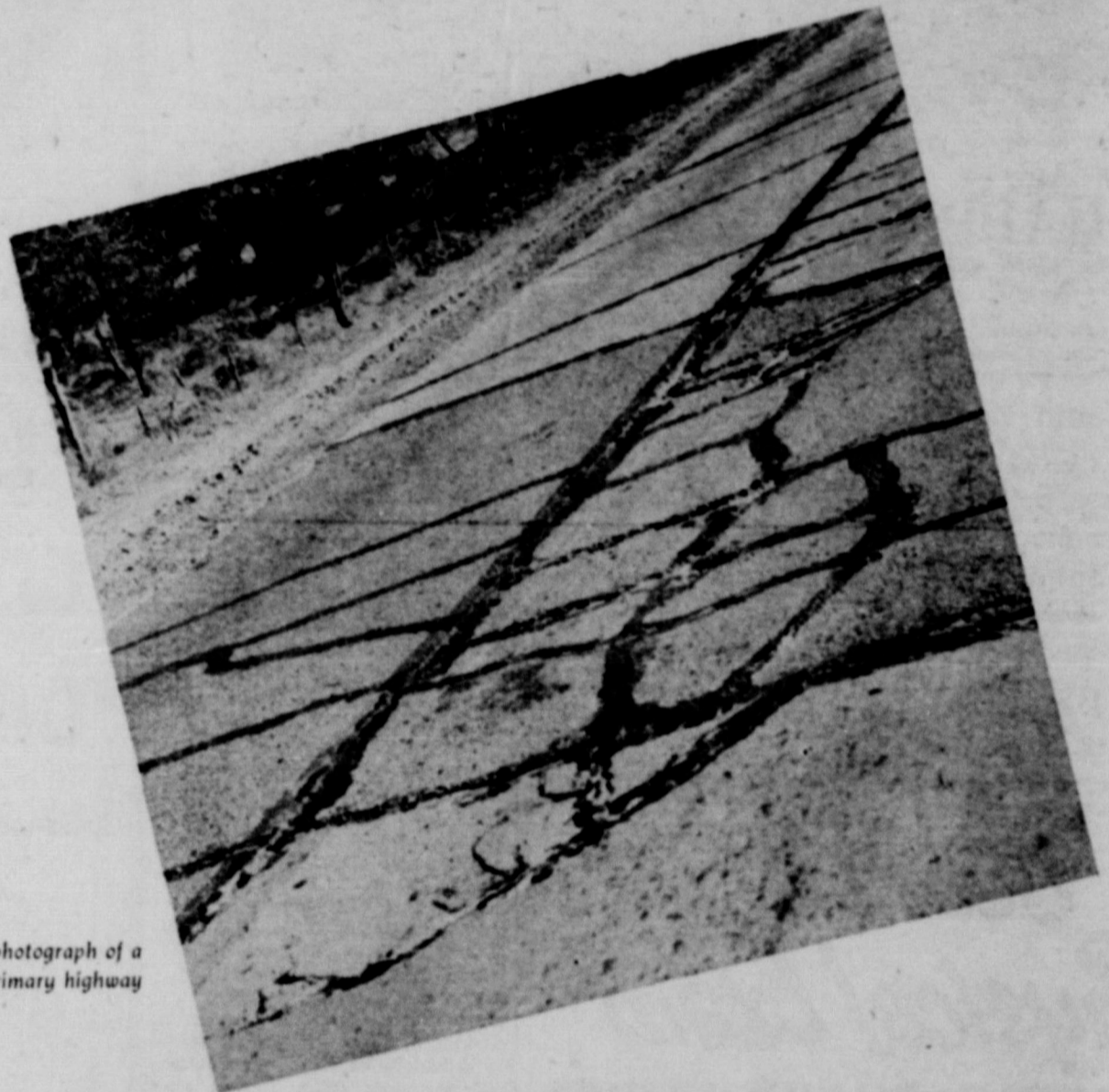

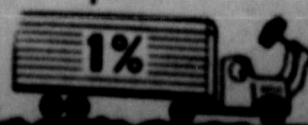

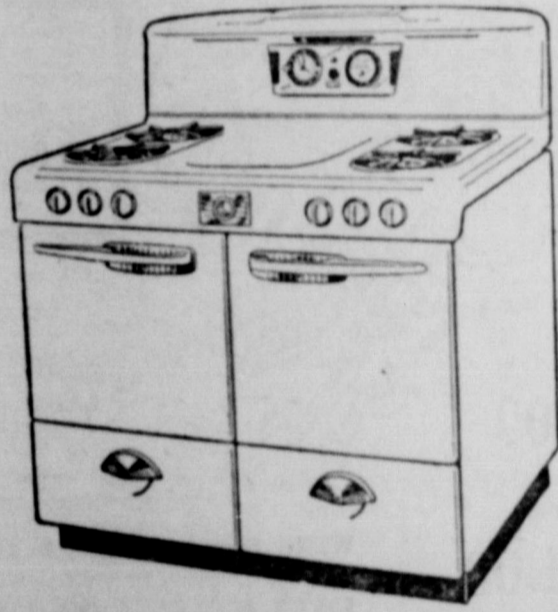
