

HERE WE GO AGAIN

Readers of the news coming out of Washington, D C., must be getting that "here we go gain" feeling It's about as certain as anything can be that a big federal deficit—perhaps totaling many billions in a single year—is looming.

Without arguing the pro's and con's of deficit spending, one thing can be said with certainty: the greater the deficit, the greater the chance will be of uncontrollable inflation. Other countries have been racked with depressions accompanied by ever-soaring prices. We aren't immune necessarily to the same fatal disease.

There are ways to hold the deficit to the lowest figure. One is to cut costs and spending in all the nonessential areas of government activity.

Another has to do with commercial services which the government provides. The charges for these should, wherever necessary, be increased to the point where they pay all the bills.

Many examples could be listed here. An excellent one is parcel post. It is a purely commercial service if there ever was one. It is competitive with taxpayingprivate carriers, national, regional and local. It is not a basic post office function. To cap the climax, it has commonly been operated at a loss—which means that all the taxpayers pay a part of the bills of those who

Post office charges are in the news now, with bills under consideration for raising rates generally. Let's not overlook parcel post.

CHATTEL WITHOUT A VOICE

Independent electric companies expand ahead of their customers' needs and constantly work to encourage the use of the service. By contrast, power shortage has often been the order of the day in areas served by publicly-owned, politically-managed systems. Orderly growth of electric power facilities cannot be assured when the funds needed depend upon the vagaries of political favor, and when politics block private develop-

This is being demonstrated again in sections of the country dominated by REA Co-ops.

Farm and rural electrification is 95% complete, so as they bore your spirit to its REA, like TVA, now seeks to perpetuate itself by extend- heavenly home, that home eternal ing its service into urban and industrial areas which it not made with hands. Your loving was never intended to serve, and where power from private companies is presently available.

REA Co-ops seek money they need for expansion through 2% loans from the Rural Electrification Administration. In other words, they ask for money from the government for less cost than it can borrow it. If REA is allowed to expand in this manner with "cheap" money at the taxpayer's expense, political pressure to turn it into a vast federal power monopoly, local in appearance, but controlled from Washington, could not be resisted.

A DOLE FOR THE U. S.?

The Portland Oregonian says "With the 'panic button' being pushed by many hands . . . for rush legislation o halt the recession, there is a clear and present danger of getting 'emergency' laws which will become a permanent burden to production, expansion and employ nent." This observation was prompted by proposed egislation which, in effect, would federalize unemployment insurance and supersede the state laws. Benefits would be increased, the period during which compencation is paid would be lengthened, and the tax (which s paid entirely by employers) would be raised. The xperience rating provision, under which employers with table employment get lower rates than those with ig personnel turnover, would be abandoned.

As the Oregonian sees it: "It is almost inconceivable at Congress, made up of representatives of the states, ould submit even in panic to what would certainly id in all-out federalization of unemployment compenition. Employment and living conditions are greatly variance over the country. . . . The ability of emloyers to sustain high benefits and a healthy economy not the same in all states. Yet the drive for federalation . . . would deprive the states of discretion in the natter." The paper adds, with full justice, that the esult would be ". . . not 'earned compensation,' but



Reorganization of the Defense Department

The President's proposal to reorganize the Defense Department will probably cause major fireworks on Capitol Hill. This applies not only to the military as a whole, but to the several departments of the military, to wit, the Army, the Air Force and the Navy. 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




