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

we are once saved, will we always be saved? That is a good question, isn't it? In I Cor. 9: 26-27 the Apostle Paul seems to have been worried about becoming lost again when he said, "But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway."

Let us read in First Corinthians the tenth chapter Verses 1-12. We notice that the younger son left his father and wasted his money on harlots, but he came back and said to his father: I have sinned against Heaven and in thy sight. angels and they would gather the sinners out of His kingdom and cast them into a furnace of fire.

SPUR FIELD DAY

Today is the annual field day of the Spur Agricultural Experiment Station. If you did not attend, you missed some very important information.
