TAX DODGERS

Taxes are one of the biggest problems facing the people of the United States. National defense depends on them. They take a huge bite out of the earnings of practically everyone. Socialized businesses that escape taxation add to the burden of every taxpayer. For that reason the following figures are of interest. They are representative of what large and small private electric companies pay to support government.

The Pacific Gas & Electric Co. of California in 1957 paid a tax bill of \$128,888,000-or 26c out of every dollar of the company's income. The federal income tax alone accounted for \$65,278,000. All the highly taxed privale electric companies of the United States paid approximately the same proportion of their earnings in taxes for a total of well over a billion dollars in 1957. Contrast this with federal and other publicowned power projects which pay no federal income taxes and which escape most or all other taxes.

It is a favorite practice for advocates of socialized power to say that the private electric industry does not pay taxes, it merely collects them from its customers by adding them to its bill. One might just as well say that no business pay taxes, or that a workman does not pay taxes-they simply add their tax to the price of their product or service and collect it from their customers or employers. Customers of tax-exempt public power plants escape the taxes which the private electric industry must collect from the users of its service. Therefore the users of public power are failing to contribute their just share of the cost of government and loading increased burdens on to other taxpayers. When both federal and local governments are scraping the bottom of the barrel for tax revenue, there is no reason why this unfair tax-exemption of public power plants should be longer continued. Such plants now furnish over 20% of the power produced in this nation. If their customers paid their just share of taxes for electricity used, government would be collecting upwards of \$300 million a year in new revenues. Why should there be tax exemption for a privileged class of customers in these critical times? COOL AS ...

SEARCHING QUESTIONS

A House committee recently held hearings on proposed bills authorizing the federal government to give or loan money to the states in order to extend the time during which unemployed workers may obtain weekly unemployment benefit payments..

One of the witnesses was Rowland Jones, Jr., president of the American Retail Federation. He pointed out that in most states the maximum duration of benefits is now 26 weeks. These are searching questions. Federalization of unemployment insurance, no matter how modest the scale at the beginning, would grow like a rolling snowball. To quote Mr. Jones again: "Our task is to concentrate on constructive measures designed to stimulate our economy and provide more employment rather than to dissipate our energies on devising a dole system for the American worker."

OIL BETS ON THE FREE WORLD

Statements made in the annual financial reports of this country's leading oil companies are of particular interest now.

From the report of the Ohio Oil Company: " much pessimism is being expressed with regard to general economic conditions, and it does seem likely that the downtrend in idustrial activity may continue at least until midyear. It is also disconcerting whenever the growth in petroleum demand seems to falter, as it has several times in the past. Nevertheless, we should not lose sight of the fact that a new record in petroleum consumption was established in 1957. Every significant detail of the bargain should be crystallized in unmistakable terms in the contract of sale. Land and fixture being sold should be clearly de scribed. A complete description of the property by lot and block or by metes and bounds, is a must, the street number being inadequate by itself.

Articles and fixtures included the sale but not always sold with houses generally should be specifically listed. Included in this category are such items a venetial blinds, removable floor overings, draperies, air conditioning units and others. In purchasing property under construct tion, complete plans and specifications form an essential part of the agreement.

The price to be paid must of course, be specified, along with method and terms of payment. If a certain sized loan is a prerequisite to the buyer's ability to complete the purchase, this fact should be noted. Sad indeed is the prospective purchaser who





The sales contract should also state the quality of the title to be conveyed to the buyer and the type of title evidence to be furnished.

"I have just signed a receipt for a house on Blank Street. Will you take over now and see that everything is O. K.?"


