





able in each county designated as a disaster area. Farmers who have suffered production losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer, and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, and repairs to machinery and other expenses incident to production of a crop. Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to family-type farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds requested to plant a crop this year. Farmers may apply for loans at the office of County Supervisor James D. Gouldy, located in the Agriculture Building in Clarendon.
