

They are painful but there is slight danger of scar or infection since only the top layer of skin is burned. Butter or some bland salve applied gently to the burn will usually relieve the pain and a loose bandage over the burn will cut down any possible infection.

In minor burns, the greatest danger lies in infection. In major burns, there is always danger of infection and also danger to the persoc in a state of shock.

Fire is essential to life, but all precautions must be observed to keep fire in its place. Just like the family car. Life is much easier with an automobile, but if that car isn't handled properly it can be a robber of life. Added to the year-round hazards of an automobile are the winter risks involved in starting the car in a closed garage and riding in the car with all windows up.

That air coming out of extaust pipe of your car contains carbon monoxide gas, a deadly poison. In an open place it is quickly thinned out in the air and is made harmless. In a closed place, however, it accumulates and when breathed into the lungs it causes suffocation. If all the windows of the car are up and no air is coming into the car, that carbon monoxide gas may accumulate in the car takes just a little circulation of air to make the odorless gas be-






