To date only \$206.76 has been donated, and the goal is \$981. However, Meacham explained that workers have not yet covered the area, by any means. In McLean, most of the north half of the business district has been worked by Neil Cooper and his helpers, and the residential section south of the Rock Island tracks has been worked. The remainder of the business section, and the north part of the residential section have not been worked by the volunteers as yet. In addition, none of the outlying communities have reported



ONE MAN'S OPINION

AS EVERYONE KNOWS, the arms program is playing an increasingly important role in sustaining and expanding the American economy. This year we will spend close to \$50,000,000,000 for national security purposes. The peak annual rate may be as much as much as \$65,000,000,000. So a great many people are wondering just what is going to happen when, and if, war spending is sharply reduced. In other words, will we be in for another big

Answers to that run the gamut, from the pessimists who think the next depression will dwarf that of the 30's, to the optimists who agrue that any really substantial break is virtually impossible. One interesting and informed discussion of the possibilities recently appeared in U. S. News & World Report. It took the form of an interview with A. S. McLeod, who is chief of that magazine's Economic Unit, and who served for many years as an economist and consultant for private business in the field of trend forecasting.

In Mr. McLeod's opinion, a crash on the 1929 scale is "highly improbable," for the reason that "the situation after the arms program slows and stabilizes is to bear no semblance to that of 1929." As he points out, there have been no such excesses in security speculation as there were then. In those days, securities were widely held on long margins, and some 39 per cent of all loans by Federal Reserve member banks were against securities. Today, he says, security loans total less than five per cent of all outstanding loans, and most securities are owned outright.





In Gray County By FOSTER WHALEY

As a result of my article in The McLean News and publicity in other papers, we have been called on for a number of application blanks for windbreak seedling trees. This is especially

true on the high plains. So many people in Gray County either have received trees or will be receiving them that I thought it would be well to print a set of instructions on the "Care of

Windbreak Seedlings": 1. Keep roots moist until trees are planted.
