



### Donley County— SOIL NEWS

Plans are well under way for the trip to Lubbock next Monday, May 26, by a local group of soil conservation enthusiasts to attend the Region 1 presentation of the Fort Worth Press' "Save the Soil and Save Texas" awards program.

The Donley County Soil Conservation District has been named the outstanding district in Region 1, comprising 51 counties in the high plains and south plains of Texas.

The five supervisors of the Donley district will receive a cash award of \$500 at this presentation. This money will be used locally for the furtherance of soil conservation work in the district.

Each cooperator of the district should take a personal pride in this honor for the district because the winning was made possible only by the cumulative efforts of all farmers and ranchers who applied conservation practices on their farms in 1951.

A special bus has been chartered for this trip and the cost will be approximately \$7 per person. The group will be guests of the Lubbock Agricultural Club for the evening meal which will be a barbecue.

### THE SCHOOL'S FUTURE

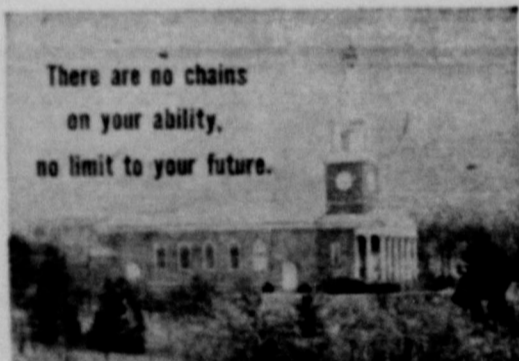
**TEXANS MUST SPEND** more of their state tax dollars on public schools or see their children handicapped by receiving an inferior education.

This warning has been issued by the Texas State Teachers Association president, Ruth Hillier.

Heavy annual increased enrollment in elementary and high schools, which is expected to continue at least through 1959-60, plus many antiquated educational plants now in use, are the main reasons for the need of more funds.

Look at it this way: this hike in attendance will make necessary a minimum of 1,000 more teachers each year, and the same number of classrooms; that, plus the need to make the profession more attractive to keep teachers from going to better paying positions, makes it imperative that additional funds be forthcoming.

The present trend indicates that the scholastic-age group of children in Texas is increasing 50,000 annually; and that trend is

expected to continue until 1959-60.

Young people coming out of college today are reluctant to enter the teaching profession. Texas teachers, for example, receive 6 per cent below the average of all employed persons in the U. S. Each year, retirement, death and the lure of more pay in other professions takes 3,500 teachers out of the schools in Texas. These must be replaced, and 1,000 more are to be needed annually in the coming years.

Actually, the cost of the public schools in Texas is not requiring much more from the tax dollar now than the schools did in 1939-40. At that time, 30.31 cents of each tax dollar went to the schools; the percentage now is 32.15.

We all realize that costs have risen; yet, the costs of our school system have not kept pace with the rest of governmental costs, or with the usual expenses of living. We will get out of our schools only what we put in them. But we must do our part in turning more money to our public schools on a state basis, not on a federal basis. Federal aid to education is being favored in some places and by some people, but all of us should join together and fight this idea. For federal aid would undoubtedly mean federal control—and we have too much of that now in other phases of our life.

Let's advocate more help to our schools, but on the state level.

### ORDINANCE NO. 90

**Purposes:** The purpose of this ordinance is to properly regulate the type of building which might be moved into the City and to regulate the type of buildings which might be constructed within the City, insofar as they are near or equal to the same type of buildings which are already constructed in the area or neighborhood where new buildings are to be constructed or moved in. The sole intention is not to discriminate against anyone but to protect as near as possible the property owner who has already made his investment within an area or neighborhood and to keep the buildings as near equal or better in each different area or neighborhood. Public interest to be placed ahead of personal rights.

**Locations of buildings:** All buildings must be placed upon the personal property of the owner; not to encroach on any portion of City property.

**Buildings under construction** at time of passage of this ordinance: The lawful construction of the building or buildings at the time of the passing of this ordinance may be continued.

Nothing in this ordinance shall be taken to prevent restoration of a building destroyed to the extent of not more than fifty-one per cent, from any cause.

Certificates of compliance shall be applied for coincident with the application for building permit and shall be issued within 10 days after erection of such building

shall have been completed in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.

**Permit:** Permits to move into the corporate limits of the City of McLean or for the construction of any buildings whatsoever will be issued by the Mayor, the City Clerk, or whatever designated person the Council may so appoint. Permits will be issued in two or more copies and made a permanent record of the records of the City of McLean.

**Cost of permits:** If other than a duly elected official of the City shall be appointed to issue permits and check the progress of the construction to see that it does conform to the plat or plats furnished the City of McLean at the time application was made to move in or build, a fee of \$10.00 per permit shall be made, said fee to be paid to the inspector if other than an elected representative of the City.

**Permit procedure:** Any person or persons desiring to move into the City or build or construct any type of buildings whatsoever, must first make application to the City Secretary for a permit. To this application must be attached an architectural drawing, either prepared by some person employed to do so or by yourselves, showing size of building in square feet floor space, type of construction, ie, frame, stucco, brick, blocks or other materials, about how building or buildings will be located on lot or lots, and give exact location of lots and block as carried on the map of the City of McLean.

The Mayor, City Secretary, or whoever might be designated to issue permits will make a study of the application and will within 3 days time issue a permit or reject the application.

**Board of adjustment:** If applicant is refused a permit, and does not wish to modify the application to conform with the purpose of this ordinance and desires a further hearing, the applicant may designate one disinterested person, the City one disinterested person, and the two of them another disinterested person, and the three of them will discuss the merits of the application as it applies to the purposes of this ordinance and a decision rendered as to whether the application for permit shall be accepted and permit issued or application rejected.

**Amendments or changes:** This ordinance may be cancelled, changed or amended at the discretion of the City Council.

**Ordinance No. 17** is annulled with the passage of this ordinance.

**Penalty for violation:** Any person or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, or who shall build or move in any buildings in violation of any detailed statement or plan submitted and approved hereunder, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to a fine of not more than one hundred dollars, and each day such violation shall be permitted to continue shall con-

New Notes in Cooking

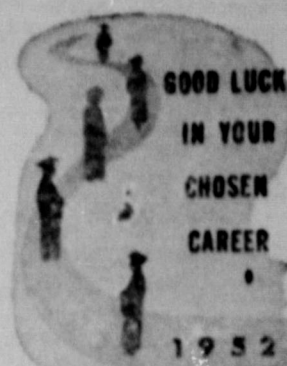

**Answer to Question No. 1:**

It is good to be out in the sun—winter or summer—since sunshine at any time of the year is a general tonic. The sun helps appetite and digestion. Rickets, once a common disorder among children, has practically been eliminated by the use of Vitamin D, the sunshine vitamin.

**Answer to Question No. 2:**

Though pulmonary tuberculosis is still a serious condition, the mortality rate has greatly decreased. This is due to early diagnosis, to some of the newer surgical procedures and certain antibiotics which help to cure or arrest the disease. Anyone who has a cough which persists more than two or three weeks

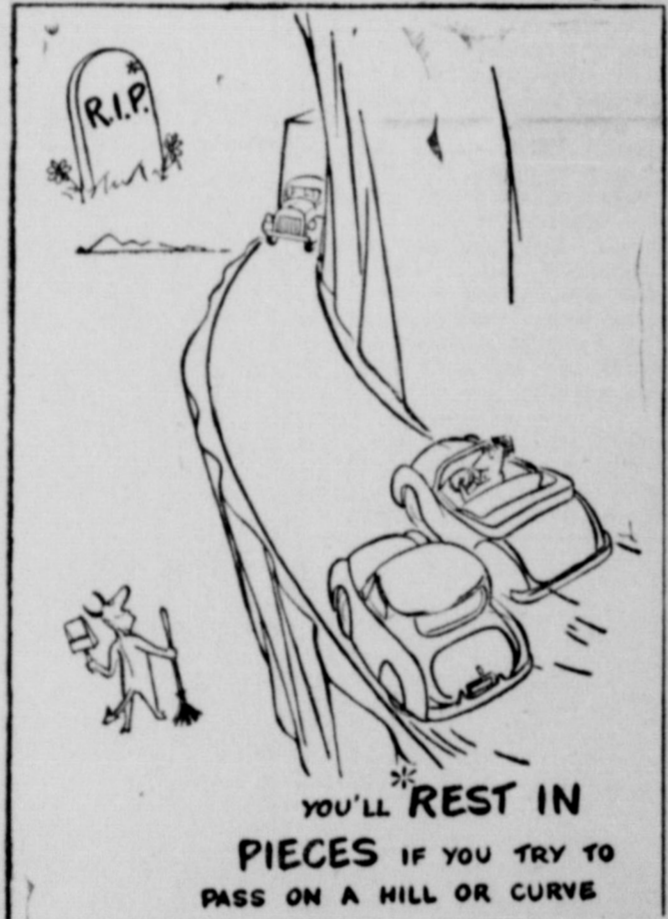
should have a chest X-ray. Many unsuspected cases can be found through chest X-ray of supposedly healthy people.

**Answer to Question No. 3:**

Your local health department keeps accurate records of deaths and their causes, births and diseases. Such facts are needed to head off epidemics and locate sources of infection. "Vital statistics" also help to spot shortcomings in your community's health services. For example, if your town's percentage of baby deaths is higher than in other communities, it's an indication your health services need investigation.

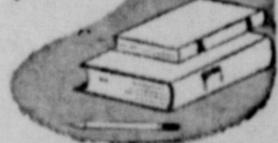

U. S. Needs Civil Defense

ORGANIZING THE HOME FRONT MEANS USING MANY SKILLS

(This is the tenth of a series of articles on civil defense, based on the booklet "This Is Civil Defense" prepared by the Federal Civil Defense Administration. It may be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., for ten cents.)

After the explosion of an atomic bomb, the resulting fires could cause more loss of life and property than the blast itself. Therefore, getting ready to fight fires is a big part of the civil defense job.

Atomic bombing would cause great fires in the area of the burst, and start hundreds of small fires in surrounding areas. With the regular fire fighting companies fully occupied by the main fires, people would have to put out these smaller fires on the spot. If they live in target areas they must know how to fight fires at home or at work.

At least one member of your family should be trained in the use of basic fire fighting tools and methods. Because women are at home much of the time, they are urged to learn how to put out fires in case of emergency. Teaching of householders to fight fires will be carried out by instructors trained by their local fire departments. Auxiliary or reserve firemen will be recruited to back up the regular companies. These volunteers will be trained by local fire companies, using regular equipment.

Your Warden or your local civil defense headquarters will tell you where to volunteer for such training.

Traffic A Big Problem

The biggest police problem in event of enemy attack, would be the control of traffic. Another big problem would be maintaining law and order. These are the most important of the duties which civil defense volunteers would help perform under the Police Service.

Auxiliary police, which many communities now have to supplement regular police forces in handling parades and crowds on special occasions, will also be

used in civil defense work. They will be a part of the local police departments, and under the command of regular police officers, their authority to act being prescribed by local law.

Civil defense will need thousands of volunteers to carry on the duties of the Police Service. You can serve your community by volunteering today.

Good Communications Essential No matter what kind of disaster strikes your community, much will depend upon good communications. In the face of enemy attack, the Communications Service would be the nerve center of civil defense for it would relay air raid warnings promptly, direct fire, police, rescue, warden, medical, engineering, and other services, and keep them in touch with one another. Without this service, headquarters would not have the information necessary to control situations brought on by disaster.

Thousands of volunteers are needed to man the communications network. Any technical training in radio, television, telegraph, or telephone work will qualify you for this service.

Neither sex nor age is a barrier to volunteering for civil defense. Retired persons with technical training are especially valuable, such as retired policemen and firemen. There are many jobs which women can fill better than men. Your local civil defense director will tell you what they are. (The next article will discuss more civil defense services.)

Children Catch T. B. Easily

Speaking of the susceptibility of children to tuberculosis, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, said this week that few people realize that babies and young children are very likely to become infected with tuberculosis if they are kept in rooms with persons who have the disease; use the same dishes, sleep in the same beds, or are handled and kissed by persons who have tuberculosis.

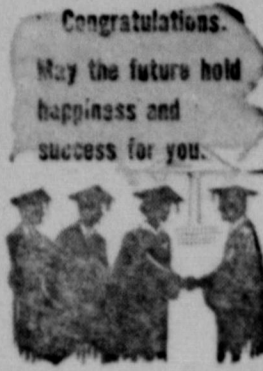
"Babies and young children pick up the germs of tuberculosis just as readily as they pick up the germs of measles or whooping cough, or of any other of the so-called children's diseases," Dr. Cox said. "But tuberculosis, unlike most diseases, has more than one form. Babies who get tuberculosis may not show the symptoms we associate with the disease in older persons. But the

disease in most cases develops rapidly and is likely to end fatally. Tuberculosis in babies and young children is a very serious matter, although recent studies have shown that if young children are removed promptly from contact with the disease and given the necessary care, many lives can be saved."

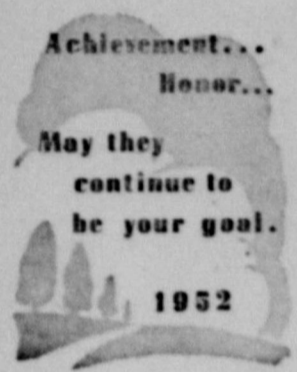
Dr. Cox said that if the presence of tuberculosis is recognized in its early stages and if medical attention is secured promptly, a great deal can be accomplished whenever the disease develops, whether in young or old.

"Tuberculosis doesn't just happen. Nobody is born with the disease. Everybody who develops tuberculosis gets it from some other source, and children and young people who have been in contact with persons having tuberculosis are especially likely to contract it."

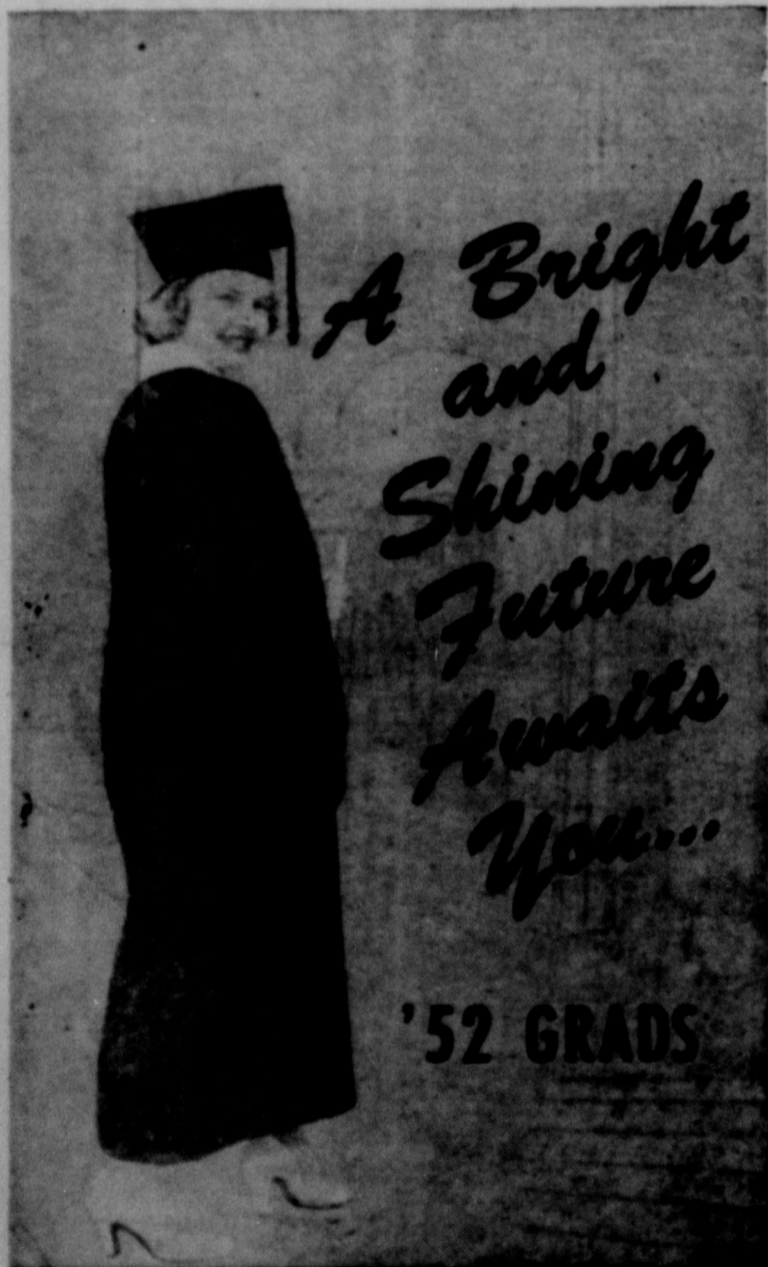

**Your Body—  
NO SEAMS IN YOU**

From the top of your head to the tip of your toes you are a closely-woven cloth. Some parts of you are bundled like stalks of sugar cane, some are packaged like bales of cotton, some are braided, some are coiled like spirals, some are hollow shells, some are frothy like cotton candy—all shapes and all forms are present in the human body.

A simpler way of saying it is the old saw, "Snakes and snails and puppy dog tails" or "sugar and spice and everything nice."

But the important health fact in what you are made of is that whatever goes into the making, you are continuous. There aren't any seams in you, you are woven and underwoven and overwoven and crosswoven in a continuous pattern. That means that what

affects one part of your body necessarily affects all parts, since the body is all a continuous pattern.

The threads with which the pattern of you is woven are handed down from your ancestors. The \$64 medical question is where the weaving starts—what part of the human body is the focal point where the "signals" are set to make you physically and mentally what you are?

This "target" area has been speculated about for centuries, and the present unofficial beginning point is placed, by many, in the pituitary gland. This is a pouch-like gland that hangs down from the floor of the brain, just above the nasal cavity, almost in the exact center of the head.

During childhood, this pituitary gland is divided into two parts, a front and a back part. A third part creeps in between those two pockets and is usually a distinct part of the pituitary in the early teens. You can picture the parts better if you visualize them as signal lights, with the front part as the green light, the middle part as the yellow light, and the back part as the red light.

The colors do fit in fairly well with the known functions of the pituitary gland. The front part is thought to be the regulator of growth, the go ahead signal for the weaving of the threads that go into your physical structure. It has an effect upon the other

glands of the body and releases cells, called alpha cells, into the bloodstream.

The back part of the pituitary gland, the red light of the signal, may be considered the break, the stop of the pattern. It has an effect upon blood pressure, upon the contraction of muscles, and upon the function of the kidneys. Its cells, called beta cells, also are found in the bloodstream.

The part played by the yellow light, the middle portion of the pituitary is little understood, though some medical scholars believe it has some tie-in with the color changes in parts of the body.

Though diseases of this gland can cause changes from normal in the development of the human physical constitution, it is not the only factor involved in growth

and development. The genes, the cells that are handed down from ancestors, are one of the important factors in the pattern of development. The nervous system, too, enters the picture, as well as the pituitary and other endocrine glands which have a bearing upon the stops and goes of growth.

Diseases within the body, any place in the body, may change the pattern at any period of a person's development. They may represent broken or knotted threads in the weaving of the cloth that makes up a human being.

To Be Held Soon on JA Ranch**

One of the largest field days ever held in Donley County is being planned at this time on

brush control on ranges. H. M. Breedlove, county agent for Donley County and in charge of the field day, says it will deal with mesquite control, sage brush, and other brush that is harmful to ranges. A good lecture will also be held on grasses for this area. C. E. Fisher, superintendent of the Spur Experiment Station, will be present to give some discussion on the brush control, and he is recognized as one of the foremost authorities on this subject in the nation. Mr. Walker, range specialist for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, will be present to discuss grasses and range management.

The field day will be held on the JA Ranch where, in 1950, one section of mesquite was sprayed with different types of chemicals on a demonstration basis. 2-4-5-T proved to be the best used, and last year 6,000 acres were sprayed.

Ranchers, farmers, county agents, supervisors of Soil Conservation District and SCS personnel, and all PMA committees are invited. In fact, Breedlove states that everyone is asked to attend this big field day, and the dates will be set next week. It will be held the first part of June and the dates will be set so that you can also see planes at work on new areas to be sprayed. This work is taking place about 18 miles from any cultivated area and all planes operate off the ranch air strip.

A 48-gun salute is fired at noon on July 4th at every army post provided with suitable artillery, to commemorate the Declaration of Independence.

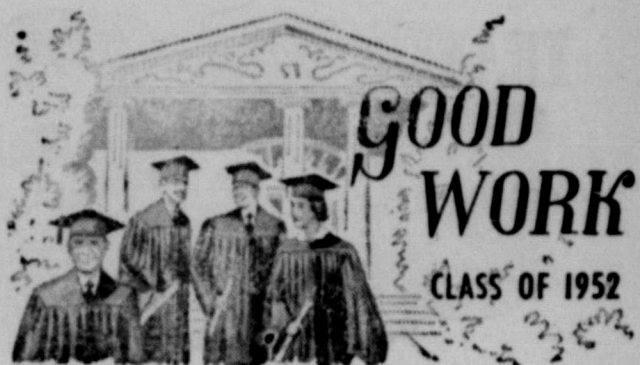

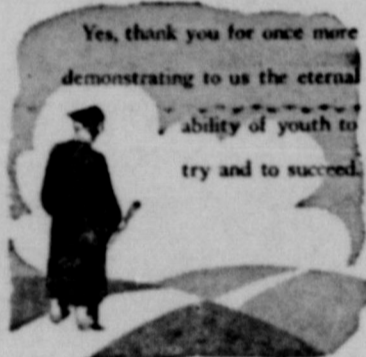

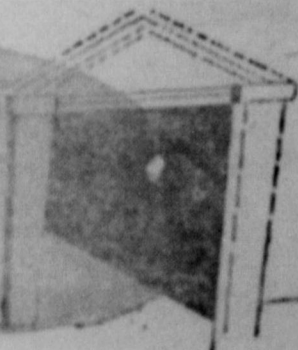
