E. V. Smith, who lives on the Binkley estate, about 19 miles north and east of town, Tuesday morning, S. R. Jones, manager of the McLean Gin, reported.

Smith had 2,100 pounds of lint, Jones stated. The bale, ginned free by the McLean Gin. made 594 pounds, with 990 pounds of cottonseed. Jones estimated it as strict middling, light spot, with 13 16 staple, although this is not the offic al government grade.

The bale was the earliest to be brought to town in several years. Other cotton in the area is reported to be popping open

O. L. Tibbets will represent the McLean-Alanreed area as commissioner, defeating Glean Jolly in the Precinct 4 race. Earnest Beck, the incumbent, was eliminated from the race in the first primary in July. Arlie Carpenter of Lefors, Precinct 1, will be the only commissioner remaining in the court after January 1.

Maguire staged a run-away in the judge's race. He carried every box in the county with the exception of Alanreed and Laketon. The total vote was 2,675 for Maguire and 1,502 for Parker. John H. Harnly was the third candidate for the judgeship and was eliminated in the first pri-

The Tibbets-Jolly race was very close in the two boxes in Mc-Lean, but Tibbets' heavy majority in Alanreed spelled the difference. Tibbets carried all three boxes-two in McLean and one in Alanreed-but when the absentee votes were thrown in with the two boxes in McLean, he had only a 7-vote lead.

Absentee balloting gave Jolly a 23-8 edge. In precinct 5, Tibbets got 189 to 181 for Jolly; in No. 17, Tibbets 165, Jolly 151; and in Alanreed, precinct 4, iTbbets

95# Jolly 31. The local vote in the judge's race was as follows: No. 4, Parker Maguire 48; No. 5, Parker 152, Maguire 203; No. 17, Parker 114, Maguire 193. Precinct 6, at Laketon, Parker's only other box, gave the present judge a 20-17 margin. All other boxes

went for Maguire. In the two other races on the run-off ballot, McLean voters favored Ernest Northcutt over Joe Moss for the civil appeals court by a margin of 430 to 127. In the supreme court race local voters chose Frank P. Culver over Spurgeon Bell by a margin of

310 to 202. Incomplete returns early this week gave Northcutt the victory in his race for the civil appeals court in Amarillo. He was leading by a margin sufficiently large to assure his election.

In the state-wide race for the supreme court place, Frank P. Culver of Fort Worth led by a sizeable margin in the unofficial tabulations over Bell of Houston. The vote was expected to continue in favor of Culver as more returns came in.







POLITICAL strategists of both parties have blandly announced that it's all over but the counting of the votes-that their presidential candidates are dead mortal cinches. That is the traditional attitude of the professionals at this stage of the game and no one with any knowledge of American politics believes for a moment in its sincerity. For, as Senator Lodge, a top Eisenhower man, has frankly said, the Eisenhower-Stevenson contest is strictly a horse race. Both parties will conduct what is known as "scared campaigns" -that is, campaigns in which they know the issue is very much in doubt, and it is necessary to painstakingly seek every possible vote.

It was inevitable that the first task undertaken by each candidate was to attempt to heal the deep party schisms that were created at Chicago. General Eisenhower has consulted at length with Taft backers, and seems to have won their willing support. Governor Stevenson has done the same thing with the embittered supporters of Kefauver, Russell, and Harriman. The top men know that, in both cases, a very high degree of party unity is the number 1

It is universally believed that the two candidates will personally conduct high-level and very dignified campaigns, as political campaigns go. The slugging and the dirty fighting, if any, will occur at the lower levels. Judged by their backgrounds, careers, and characters, neither General Eisenhower nor Governor Stevenson seem the sort who could lower themselves to ranting and namecalling. If this is true, it will certainly be an important service te national unity in itself.






