If the federal government can take over the tidelands from the states, then why couldn't the federal government take over all inland takes, should oil or something of value be discovered in them? And your own farm, or your own business, if it was for the "good of the federal government's income?"

The issue concerning the tidelands is more important than the tidelands themselves. The increasing trend toward more power in the central government, the trend toward more power which our last two presidents have sought, must be stopped. And the quicker it is stopped, the better our chances to retain our freedoms

Some national Democratic leaders, Senator Johnson of Texas for one, do not want to trust the Republicans, and therefore have announced they favor Governer Stevenson despite his stand on the tidelands issue. 




