British Living Under Hardships America Never Has Experienced

The American public which has just completed paying its income taxes might be interested in incomes, income taxes, and prices here as contrasted with those in our principal ally, Great Britain, U. S. News & World Reports gives the lowdown in a series of stories in this week's issue.

In the first place, the weekly wage of the average American worker is \$60, that of the average British worker only \$21.

Whereas food prices are tending downward in the U.S., they are tending upward in Britain, but the gap between them is large. A pound of bread in the U. S. costs 16 cents; in Britain, 4.6 cents, A. quart of milk in the U. S costs 22.7 cents, in Britain 15 cents. A pound of beefsteak costs \$1.12 in the U.S., 52 cents in Britain. The gap in the case of coffee, tea, potatoes, chicken, eggs and bacon is smaller.

Keeping in mind that wages are three times higher in this country than in Britain, here are some contrasting figures on the income tax in both countries. A mar-

This Day In Texas

Governor William P. Hobby on this day in 1919 gave his approval to a resolution making the pecan the state tree of Texas.

The resolution had been adopt ed by the Senate on March 14 and by the House on March 18. It became effective ninety days after adjournment of the legislature on

Quite probably the last will and testament of former governor James S. Hogg inspired the selection of the pecan as the state tree. That noted Texas statesman requested that trees be planted ov-er his grave in lieu of a man-made shaft. Today towering pecan trees mark his last resting place in the state cemetery at Austin.

Actually the pecan has grown to mean much more to the state than a sentimental symbol. With an annual production worth nearly five million dollars, Texas is the leading pecan state in the nation, San Saba, Brownwood, Wharton and San Angelo are the principal shipping centers for pecans in the shell. San Antonio leads as a shelling center, In Weatherford a plant processes shell and other pecan waste into oil and tannin.

Perhaps the most famous pecan grower in Texas today is John Nance Garner, former vice presi-dent of the United States.

Men Who Are Honest Are Not Up For Scorn; Should Be Praised

World conditions undergo rapid changes and so do the minds and thoughts of men. James, a New York Times correspondent in Russia, then under Communist rule, in . 1930: "There are forty American corporations

putting many millions of dollars into Russia under the industrial revolution. The leaders of these corporations must believe that the Kremlin has at least a fighting

In an article the day before, James remarked:

"For at least another decade, the people of Russia must do the bidding of Communist dictators; they must eat poor food and wear poor clothes, they must submit to rule by threat of hunger, and they must work when and where they are told...The dictators must be successful in making them do that if the revolution is to go

More specifically put, James was aware of Communism's influence and so were other Americans. Yet, at that time, so many U. S. corporations and powerful individuals were staking huge fortunes on the success of the Red regime. It was there for them to see-the dreaded police state rule-yet no one dreamed the Kremlin's leaders would soon engulf Eastern Europe and gobble them up into the So-

and the West's Democracies. And, I doubt whether some of our recently-awakened Congressmen were aware of what would happen in 1952 when they were so sound asleep back in the 1930s.

Churchill Tries Classical Road To Bring Back British Strength

"Seven per cent will bring gold from

That's what they used to say in London when London was the world's financial capital. Whenever there was a money stringency, up would go interest ratesto 4 per cent, 5 per cent, 6 per cent. Then, so the theory went, and the practice too, money-gold-would flow to London from everywhere. Gradually, the stringency would ease.

Today Winston Churchill's government trying to see if the moon, as in the "good old days," is made of gold In one stroke, the Bank of England interest rate was raised from 21/2 per cent to 4 per cent. One and one-half points overnight!

Only in time of great financial crisisas when the British quit the gold standard in 1931-has the bank rate gone up more than I percentage point. Then it went up from 21/2 per cent to 41/2 per cent. During the 1929 stock market crash here, the bank rate went up only one point.

Maybe this isn't a crisis in England, but the 114-point rise shows that Churchill and his Chancellor of the Exchequer, R. A. Butler, mean business. And in the classical way. They're cutting Britain's cloth to an impoverished pocketbook. The theory this: Let costs rise, and people, inevitably, will buy less. That applies not only to the price of food, but also to the price of money.

Thus, Butler's new budget announced a reduction in food subsidies. That means the cost of living will rise. If labor unions do not win wage increases, personal consumption will drop. If people don't reduce their consumption of food, then they'll have to stop buying something else.

The rise in the cost of money works in the same way. A British company, which has to borrow at 5 per cent to put up a new building or buy new equipment, will give its calculating machine an extra whirl or two to make sure that the investment is profitable. The higher rate is designed to cut down domestic investment in new plant and equipment. Corporations now have to pay 4.7 per cent for longterm money. Presumably that will go still

These days, any drop in British consumption is desirable For the British have been living beyond their means. They've been importing more goods and services than they can pay for. That explains the intermittent runs on British gold and dollar balances.

But the increase in the bank rate won't work wonders automatically. The rate has to be made effective. One of the first acts of the Churchill government in November was to advance the bank rate from 2 per cent to 21/2 per cent. The call money rate rose from 0.62 per cent to 1 per cent. Yet it still was so low that merchant bankers still found they could get plenty of funds through regular commercial banking channels. They could ignore the Bank of England.

However, the Bank of England, like the Federal Reserve System, can sell government securitles in the open market, and in that way dry up the supply of excess private and commercial funds. Then banking firms would be forced to go to the Bank of England. The 4 per cent rate would become effective.

More than that, the higher rates of inerest in London will tend to keep British capital at home. British investors, fearful perhaps of devaluation of the pound, have tried to get their money out of England. If they've sold goods abroad, for instance, they haven't imported the foreign exchange. Britons have invested in Australia. But now they'll reconsider.

Still further, British exporters and British importers will try to get credit outside of Britain-to avoid the higher interest rate. A British importer of cotton, for example, will ask for American credit rath er than borrow in London at 4 per cent and higher. That would tend to increase the credit available to Britain.

To be sure, the return to economic classicism-to orthodoxy-will add to the cost of carrying the government debt In this, Butler is departing from American techniques. Both postwar U. S. Secretaries of the Treasury-Fred Vinson and John W. Snyder-have considered it more important to keep down the cost of the debt than to let interest rise as a deterrent to high consumption, high investment, and

Thus the British move is significant here: Will it show that orthodox methods will help to control inflation? Or, to put it another way, if 7 per cent could bring gold from the moon, will 4 per cent be sufficient to draw gold from Fort Knox.

Sea Urchins Cut With Sharp Spines

Some plants produce rounded burs (also spelled "burrs") with many sharp points. These are likely to eling to the hair of an animal which brushes against them, or to the clothing of people.

A bur is a part of a plant. If it is dropped in a place where it can sprout, a new bush with burs may be found there the next year.

In the sea there are animals which look like burs. They have points, or spines, all The animals of which I speak are sea

urchins of special kinds. They may be the size and shape of a hen's egg, an orange or a grapefruit. Some have the shape of

Tibre may be only one or two dozen long spines around a sea urchin, but certain kinds have hundreds of spines. The spines jut out from the shell-like cov-

two inches long, and the spines may extend an inch more on each end. If you look far enough about the southern and western shores of Ireland, you may find thousands of these urchins. They like to make their homes in holes in rocks. There are so many kinds of sea urchins

The purple egg urchin has a body about

that we cannot give a general length for their spines. Some spines are less than a quarter of an inch long, but others have a length of two inches or more. Certain kinds, the egg urchin for example, have such sharp spines that they can cut through a pair of shoes worn by a man. The spines of most sea urchins offer lit-

tle harm, unless to prick or cut, but some of them send out poison. The turban ur-chin is one of those with poisonous spines. Besides the spines, a sea urchin has tubes which go through openings in the shell. These tubes serve as feet, and a single urchin may have hundreds of them. They are used to move this strange

animal from place to place. On the under side of a sea urchin is the mouth. This is armed with five teeth. Muscles move the teeth, and in that way chew the food which is taken in.
