

Apply a band just above the bite. apply alcohol to the region around it, and make a cross cut about one-fourth inch deep in the skin over each fang mark Withdraw the venom with a suction cup, or with small glasses having a diameter of from 11/2 to 2 inches, in the following manner: Moisten the bite area with water, cold cream, or petroleum jelly. Light a small scrap of paper, drop it into the bottom of the glass, and allow it to burn a moment, then dump the burning paper into a pan of water Press the mouth of the glass over the bite area until the cooling air starts suction; leave it in place a few minutes, while preparing another glass to replace it. Continue suction until considerable fluid has been recovered or until the doctor ar-

Once rabies develops in man, it is fatal. Too many people still fail to realize the possible seriousness of dog bite, or the bites of other animals like cats, squirrels, and skunks. Because the animal may be rabid, it should be captured and penned up for a ten-day observation period, if at all possible. The wound should be washed with soap and water to remove all saliva, and the doctor called immediately. He will decide what further steps should be taken.
