

Petie, youngest son of Peb and Vergie Everett - long time resident of McLean-right now should be proud he chose Frankie from among his many dates on and off the campus of good old Tiger-land. Frankie is the daughter of Mrs. Lucille Gaines and the granddaughter of Mrs. W. E. Kennedy, both early settlers of Alanreed.

It seems, according to the daily newspaper published in Jackson, Tennessee, that Frankie's artistic mind coupled with her imagination has brought the Everetts a fortune, as well as share in the finding of a group of original Audubon paintings The Everetts now live at 54 Elm wood, Jackson, Tenn.

On a return trip to Evansville to pick up the last of her belongings she asked Frankie. her friend while the two families lived in Evansville, to accompany her. While in the basement, Frankie spied the panels and asked what was to become of


